YMCA Program Requires Support Of Public Chest

The Roseburg YMCA has a variety of programs aimed at character building and providing useful recreation activities for the youth of the area. Local Y Secretary Merlin C. Donaldson reports. He made the statement recently in a report on the current Y corporate membership drive.

Donaldson said that about 95 percent of the local YMCA program involves children from six years old through high school age. He said a few people of the community have erroneously come to believe that the Y program emphasized activities for adults.

The local YMCA served 1,278 grade school, Junior high school and Senior high school youths during the month of March, Donaldson reported. He said only 81 adults participated in Y programs during the month.

Donaldson said the only way the Y can continue to serve these young people is through the Community chest, augmented by the corporate memberships in the YMCA. About 95 percent of all funds received from these two sources are spent here in Roseburg on the local program for boys and girls. The adult programs are paid for by the participants, Donaldson said.

At present, the YMCA has sold one-fifth of goal of total corporate memberships needed this year.

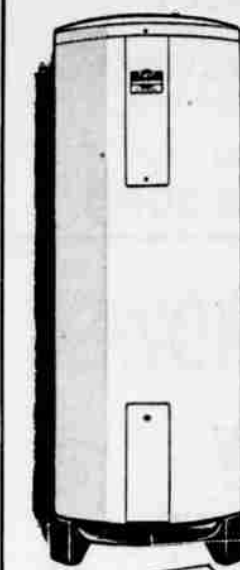
