De Luxe Flavor In Spiced Prunes

Many a less expensive meal disappears on a de luxe taste when served with a fruit conserve. Dried fruits, now abundant, make conserves and marmalades of rich flavor and require very little cooking skill. Try a few now to brighten your economy main dishes.

Apricot Almond Marmalade (Makes approximately 1 pint)

Two cups dried apricots, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 1/2 cup sliced blanched almonds, 1 cup orange juice, 2 teaspoons grated orange rind, 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind.

Rinse apricots, cover with water and cook until soft and water is well evaporated, 30 to 40 minutes. Beat apricots until smooth, add sugar, almonds, orange juice and rinds, and cook about 20 minutes stirring frequently. Pour into hot glasses and when cold, seal with paraffin.

Spiced Stuffed Prunes (Makes about 2 pints)

Five cups uncooked prunes, 1 cup white sugar, 3 cups brown sugar (packed), 9 cups water, 2 cups cider vinegar, 3 tablespoons pickling spices (in bag), five 4-inch pieces stick cinnamon, 2 tablespoons honey, 6 thin slices whole orange (rind included), 1 tablespoon rum (flavoring, walnut meats).

Rinse prunes. Combine sugars, water, vinegar, spices, honey and slices of orange in large kettle and heat to boiling. Add prunes and boil 1 to 1 1/2 hours (more water may be added as and if needed). Remove from heat and add rum flavoring. Cool. Lift prunes from
