Carl Donough, state director of the Office of Price Stabilization, accompanied by H. C. Prensowski and Dr. Paul Volpe, will discuss the provisions of OPS regulation No. 7 and amendment two with the retail merchants of the Roseburg area at 3 p. m. Tuesday, April 24, in the city council chamber. Mayor A. G. Flegel will present Mr. Donough. Arrangements for this meeting were made by Mayor Flegel with the cooperation of Harold Hickerson, manager of the chamber of commerce. Hickerson reports that Donough and his associates are well qualified to assist in the interpretation of the OPS regulations and will be more than willing to answer questions asked by any dealer who may be confused by the regulation. Furniture, wearing apparel, jewelry, glassware, chinaware, kitchen ware, radios, record players, T.V. sets and sporting goods are, according to the best information the chamber of commerce has, included among the items controlled by regulation seven and its amendments. Hickerson claims that Donough's visit to Roseburg will give local retailers an opportunity to receive information valuable to them.

Pictures On Conservation Will Be Shown To Children

Motion pictures dealing with conservation subjects are to be shown soon in Douglas county schools. George Myers, Yoncalla, chairman of the education committee of the Umpqua Conservation Council, told council members Friday night that arrangements have been made to secure pictures from the U. S. Forest service for programs during the month of May.

The pictures will be made available to all schools equipped to show them. Pictures also are to be obtained from the State Game Commission. It also is possible that films dealing with proper and safe use of firearms will be made available to the council by two manufacturers of guns and ammunition. The Yoncalla club, Myers said, is planning a course in firearms instruction for children under 18 years of age in that community. Friday's meeting of the council was held at the Douglas Forest Protective association's hall at Canyonville with the South Umpqua Rod and Gun club as host.

President Ernest Seaton announced that Cottage Grove and Black Butte clubs have joined the council, which also includes clubs at Drain, Yoncalla, Roseburg and Canyonville.

Secretary L. D. Bloom presented a communication from the State Hydroelectric commission concerning the application by the California Oregon Power company for two power generation units on Clearwater river. James Vaughn, district game supervisor, told the council the sites had been inspected and that no objection was being made to the installation aside from request for enough water escapement over dams to preserve scenic values. Clearwater river contains little fish life, Vaughn said.

Charles S. Collins, county parks superintendent, reported on the public parks acquisition and improvement program. He announced purchase of a 3.31-acre tract at the forks of The Umpqua river and said negotiations are in progress for additional land at Winchester Bay. Parking areas have been graded along the North Umpqua river between Rock creek and the forest boundary, he reported, adding to facilities for recreational use of the sites.

Bill Pitney, fishery biologist, reported that the spring chinook run still is ahead of previous years with 84 fish tallied at the counting station. Catch records show 56 fish taken to date above the Bullock bridge.

L. D. Bloom and George Myers reported on the recent "Show Me" trip made by sportsmen and game department officials to study conditions on winter deer range in central Oregon.

Following the business meeting, motion pictures were shown by Kenneth Gilkeson of Roseburg, the South Umpqua club served refreshments.

Women At Penitentiary Endure Restrictions

The world, after release, would be private. The women are quartered in a cell and complain that it is very jangling on the nerves to never be able to be alone, even for a few minutes. Even the bathtubs are lined up—side by side—under four of them. The women are allowed some freedom in their living quarters and the cell doors are left unlocked during part of the day. However, they are strictly forbidden to go visiting and must stand well out in the hall when conversing with neighbors. When someone judges and sits on a bed to visit in the next cell, she loses her privileges for several days—a no mail, no visitors, no shows or entertainments if any should be available. For repeated offenses the women have been subjected to solitary confinement in the dank, dark cells, sometimes called "bull pens." Several days here with a skimpy morning and evening meal, no reading or occupation of any kind, not even an exchange of words with the one who brings the food, is guaranteed to do something to a woman's spirits if not her morals.

I am not attempting to indict the system when I mention that, for I agree that some enforcement of discipline must be necessary, and this may be an improvement over the whippings in the old days.

One of the most vitriolic complaints which has come to the attention of the senate committee investigating the women's section of the penitentiary, concerned the difficulty in getting medical attention. The committee verified the fact that one woman inmate pleaded for months to be allowed to see a doctor, but when she finally was given medical attention, she was told it was too late to help her and she should have come sooner. She is now dying of cancer, and the other women, who know how she begged to be taken to a doctor, are naturally bitter and resentful. Tragic as this may be, I suppose one can understand that undoubtedly some women plead ill health to get out of work, and the malron naturally becomes a little cynical.

Eugene Sawmill Burns; Loss Set At \$300,000

EUGENE — (AP) — The heart of one of this lumber center's largest sawmills burned this morning with a loss estimated at \$300,000. The Zellner Lumber Co. fire started at 4:55 a. m. and the head rig and resaw structure and other expensive machinery was a mass of melted metal by 6 a. m. Six fire companies from the area confined the blaze to the machinery core itself, saving 2,000,000 board feet of stored lumber and much other valuable equipment. The mill is owned by George Zellner of Eugene and lies in the Seneca district just north of Eugene.

Sen. Vandenberg Mourned By Many

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. — (AP) — The week gathered here today for the funeral of world-renowned Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg.

Last rites for the famed bipartisan foreign policy advocate of the Republican party brought together the man in ton hat and muscled factory worker.

Trains and planes brought official delegations from the capitol at Washington.

Vandenberg's neighbors and fellow citizens—the oldest of whom knew him as the business man's son—joined in a huge and solemn tribute.

Funeral services were set for 2 p. m. (EST) at the Park Congregational church. The church with capacity for 1,000 installed a microphone in the basement to carry the Rev. Edward Archibald Thompson's sermon to another 500 mourners.

Sen. Vandenberg, who served in Congress more than a score of years, died Wednesday night after a long illness. He was 67.

10 Percent Salary Hike For 70 Officials OK'd

SALEM — (AP) — Ten percent salary increases for 70 state officials were approved today in a bill passed by the House today and sent to the Senate.

Governor Douglas McKay would be boosted to \$11,900 a year, plus his \$100 monthly tax-free expense account.

The state health officer would be boosted to \$10,000, and the superintendents of the state hospital, Eastern Oregon state hospital and Fairview home for feeble-minded persons would get \$8,910 each.

U.S. Atomic Stockpile Prevents War—Deane

DALLAS — (AP) — Gordon Deane head of the U.S. atomic energy program, says the nation's atomic stockpile thus far has prevented a third world war.

The chairman of the country's Atomic Energy commission spoke yesterday before hundreds of lawyers. They were here at an international law and relations institute of the American Bar association's southwestern regional convention.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Gant mortuary, Myrtle Creek, at 2 p. m. The Rev. Carl Pershall of the Riddle Baptist church will officiate. Interment will be in the Riddle cemetery.
