Annual Report Of Roseburg Salvation Army Shows Considerable Aid Given

The Roseburg Salvation Army post rendered considerable assistance to the needy in the city and Douglas county in 1950, according to the annual report recently released by Lt. and Mrs. Dal Madsen, commanding officers of the Roseburg post.

More than 1500 persons applied for aid and the post provided the following services: 259 lodgings, 288 meals, 7 transit, 96 garments and shoes, and other aid. A total of 576 transients were assisted.

Assistance Listed

Families were aided by four grocery orders, 2965 garments, and 235 pairs of shoes. Assistance rendered at Christmas by the post included: 31 grocery orders, 172 individuals assisted, 150 toys distributed, two children's Christmas parties with an attendance of 220 and two prisoner's families aided.

Income for the year totaled more than \$12,000 which was nearly all absorbed by expenses. Community Chest support amounted to \$3,907.69.

Evangelist Dated For Week At North Roseburg Church



The Rev. George Millen, above "The Singing Evangelist," arrived in Roseburg Wednesday to conduct special meetings at the North Roseburg church from April 29 to May 6. The Rev. Mr. Millen will be the guest speaker and baritone soloist for the "Good News Campaign," a week of evangelistic meetings, which are open to the public. He previously appeared at the Roseburg high school in January, 1950, as the director and soloist for the "Gospel Gleemen," a male chorus of 30 ministers.

"The Singing Evangelist" is actually the pastor of the Unionville Evangelical United Brethren church near Dayton, where he recently directed an inter-church choir. Millen was recently appointed as youth advisor for the Evangelical United Brethren churches in Oregon and Washington, in addition to being in frequent demand as song leader and soloist in evangelistic meetings and summer camps.

Although the public meetings of the "Good News Campaign" do not begin until next Sunday, the Rev. Mr. Millen will speak to various groups within the congregation of the North Roseburg church. Wednesday night he will speak to an audience of women only, telling them "How Women can Win Converts to the Christian Faith." Thursday night he will be in charge of the mid-week service, emphasizing the importance of prayer in the life of a church; Friday his audience will be entirely men, as he speaks on "A Man's Religion." Saturday night will be given over to young people in a time of recreation and inspiration.
