Air Forc To Add 40,000 Women

WASHINGTON — (P) — The air force will add more than 40,000 women by next June, it was announced totaly.

This will raise the women's airforce strength from the present 7,000 level to about 48,000, of whom 4,000 will be officers and 44,000 enlisted air women.

The air force plans to commission 200 officers monthly beginning in June. At the same time the enlistment quota will be jumped from 480 each month to rise to a projected level of some 1700. Thereafter enlistments wilg . Thereafter enlistments wilg to a porjected level of some 0 monthly during the first half

of 1952.
Commissions in the W.A.F will be offered to women whether or not they have previous military service. Applicants must be at least 24 and not more than 32 years old. They must have a college dereee and three years of business or professional experience, preferably in a supervisory capacity.

Magazine Story About MacArthur Branded 'False'

NEW YORK — GP —An aide to Gen. Douglas MacArthur says the ousted Far Eastern commander gave "his wholehearted support" to President Truman and "made desperate efforts to carry out his policies and directions" up until the tlay he was dismissed.

The aide, Maj. Gen Courtney Whitney, held a surprise news conference Thursday several hours after MacArthur and his party returned from the closed senate hearing in Washington.

Whitney's conference dealt largely with a story in Newsweek magazine.

The general's personal aide denied Newsweek's assertion that his chief had been planning a "war" on President Truman before the latter issued his ouster order.

"General MacArthur's sole effort was support of the President and the President's decisions," Whitney said.

Newsweek says that, 90 days before his ouster, MacArthur "already had started compiling and indexing all the pertinent documents" defending his ideas as opposed to those of the administration.

"For the job," the magazine says, "he (MacArthur) asked a friend, an old army sergeant who had served under him for 30 years and was living in retirement in

had served under him for 30 years and was living in retirement in Tennessee, to return to active duty. The sergeant had picked eight enlisted men as his assistants and they had gone to work."

Whitney described the assertion as "completely false."

Newsweek adds that, as a result of nine soldiers' efforts, MacArthur had 21 foot-lockers "crammed with documents" aboard his plane when he left Tokyo.
