**Job Abolishment Ends Benefits, Court's Decision**

BOSTON — (AP) — "A man whose job is abolished by industrial progress is not entitled to unemployment benefits." That ruling was made by the Massachusetts supreme court in the case of Morris Weiner, 74, of Boston, a stone polisher in the lithographic trade since 1916. The ruling overturned a district court decision which had awarded Weiner weekly unemployment compensation payments.

Weiner was laid off Sept. 15, 1947, after working 19 years at the Boston Bank Note company. His claim for unemployment benefit payments was denied him by the Massachusetts division of employment security and later granted by the district court. The supreme court's ruling said the division of employment security found Weiner was "one of a dying trade."
