Bookmaking Case Falls For Lack of Evidence

Tax Plans Aimed At Several Types Of Gambling

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House ways and means committee has voted to impose a special 10 percent tax on bookmakers, numbers operators and lottery managers. Under the committee's plan, the government would collect a \$50 a year occupational tax from the operators of such gambling systems. Race track pari-mutuels would not be taxed.

In another move, the committee tentatively decided to boost the tax on coin-operated gambling devices, including slot machines, from \$150 to \$250 a year. Earlier this year, Congress made it a criminal offense to transport slot machines across state lines, except where they are permitted by state law. The hike on the slot machine tax was counted on to bring in an additional \$7,000,000 a year, but no estimate was available on probable proceeds from the tax on bookies and numbers writers. In the only other revenue-raising decision of the day, the committee voted to classify tobacco pipes, cigar holders and cigaret holders as jewelry, making them subject to a 20 percent tax at retail. This is estimated to bring in an additional \$8,000,000. The tax drafters decided to do nothing at this time about pro-

posals to impose a federal tax on used automobiles. Rates of 7 to 8 percent were discussed. The committee already has voted to hike the tax on new cars from 7 percent to 10. Also rejected were proposals to impose a tax on golfers' greens fees and charges paid by tennis court users; and to levy a 20 percent tax on pleasure boats, motor driven and sail.

Armed Forces Day Will Be Open House In Nation

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Many military installations over the nation will hold open house on Saturday in observance of armed forces day. Parades, mass meetings and other demonstrations have been planned in the major cities and hundreds of smaller communities, the Defense department said. It released a "cordial invitation" from Secretary Marshall to all citizens to visit military posts "and become better acquainted with your own military forces."

President Truman will review a parade down Constitution avenue here, and will address an armed

forces day dinner. Vice President Barkley will speak in St. Louis. The department said many army and marine posts will be open to the public and that the navy will conduct open house at shore installations and aboard ships in port. The air force will send eight B-36's from its strategic air command to fly over capitals of all 48 states and Washington. Most air force bases will be open, too, the department said. Armed forces day replaces the former separate "days" for the army, navy and other service branches.
