## Non-Anesthesia Surgery Common **Among Russians**

LOS ANGELES - (P - Major surgery without anesthesia is a common practice in Russia, a Bri-tish neurologist asserts. Dr. MacDonald Critchley, direc-tor of the neurological institute, London, told the annual conven-tion of the California Medical as-sociation;

sociation: "I personally have witnessed

I personally have witnessed major operations which were per-formed in Russia without the slight-est use of any form of anesthesia. The patients betrayed not the slightest evidence that they feit any pain. There was no indica-tion that these people had been hyponized. It's possible their part-Oriental blood had someting to do with the phenomenon." He said he witnessed a major operation on a woman in Russia who was not even given a seda-tive.

"The woman bore the pain stoi-cally. The surgeon, in reply to my questions, said it was a common practice. He said: "We Russians are better able to stand pain than other races."


