Dodgers Lead League Two Games; Beavers Drop Twin Bill To Oaks

Phillies Whip Pirates Twice; Yanks Score

Whew! That was a spectacular sabbatical spree major league baseball staged yesterday. Double figures scores, lopsided shutouts, overflowing crowds, streak hitting, streak hurling, a homer-hitting pitcher, another who won two games in one day. Nearly everything happened on this traditional day of rest, Whew!

Here is what happened in a nutshell:

1. The Philadelphia Phillies sank the Pirates in a double-decker, 17-0 and 12-4 as the season's home record crowd of 36,166 Pittsburgh patrons moaned and groaned. The Phil's Richie Ashburn collected eight hits in the doubleheader.
2. Brooklyn routed the Reds in both ends of a doubleheader, 16-3 and 14-4 before 29,427 suffering Cincinnati fans.
3. The Cardinals rallied for five runs after the first two batters were retired in the seventh inning to come from behind and nick the New York Giants, 8-7, before 22,666 screaming St. Louisians.
4. Dick Fowler won his first game in almost a year, extending Cleveland's losing streak to six with a 2-1 triumph for Philadelphia. The Indians, however, won the second game of the twin bill, 5-3.
5. Fortynonyear-old Emil (Dutch) Leonard was credited with both wins as the Cubs came from behind to whip Boston's Braves twice, 4-3 and 5-4, to the delight of 42,988 cheering Chicagoans.
6. Undefeated Ed Lopat pitched his seventh consecutive victory for the Yankees with a 7-3 triumph over the St. Louis Browns before 29,427 chilled and dampened New Yorkers. He also hammered his third home run of the season. Rain forced the postponement of the scheduled second game.
7. Hal Newhouse became the third visiting southpaw to go the route and win in Fenway park as Detroit defeated the Red Sox, 8-4 before 30,329 blue Bostonians.
8. Chicago's surprising White Sox made it four in a row on their traditional tough eastern swing, shading the Senators, 5-4 to the dismay of 11,773 Washington well-wishers.

Hard Victory

Medford's Cheney Studs Edge Umpqua Chiefs, 3-2

Medford's Cheney Studs forged a 3-2 win over the Umpqua Chiefs off the bat of Norm Lucich Sunday afternoon at Medford.

The Stud outfielder pulled victory out of the hat in the bottom half of the ninth inning by rapping a double with the bases loaded. Two runs came in to erase the tight 2-1 lead the Chiefs had guarded so jealously since the third inning.

Roseburg pushed over its two

runs in the third inning. After Pitcher Bus Sporer opened the inning with a single, Lovell Baker advanced him with a short bingle to first center. Hal Zurcher reached first on pitcher Paul Gehrman's error. Gehrman then walked Roseburg catcher Les Winters, allowing Sporer to score. George Sanders smacked a line drive to deep second and was thrown out at first but Baker crossed the plate on the play.

The Studs got their initial run in the fourth, when third sacker Alex McDonald skirted the sacks after being hit by a pitched ball. Witt McDonald on first, Medford catcher Frank Roelandt hit an easy fielder's choice, but Sporer threw wild to second base allowing both to reach base safely. Lucich then drove a long fly to left field, scoring McDonald.

Sporer had a near-perfect day, both on the mound and at the plate. He pitched five innings and gave up only one hit and one run, and hit two singles in two times at bat. Zurcher pitched the last four innings, giving up only four hits, two of them in the fatal ninth.

Baker and Virgil Sanders also looked good in the batter's box. Sanders hitting two for four, and Baker two for five. Dexter Garey and Zurcher got Roseburg's other two bingles.

Roseburg will again meet Medford next Sunday, this time in a league game at Roseburg. Manager Bun Kelsey announced that practice will be held Tuesday evening.
