Voice of America Frustrates Soviet Jamming Try

PORTLAND — (P) — The Voice of America is getting through the Iron Curtain better than it ever did, despite tremendous jamming efforts of the Soviets.

That was reported here by S. S. Marlowe, special assistant to Charles M. Hulton, general manager of the State department's information and education program. Hulton is a former University of Oregon journalism professor.

Marlowe presented a showing of both American efforts and Soviet counter-propaganda in films and radio.

He said that for every dollar this country spends on its "voice" program, Russia is spending \$5 for jamming. There are 1,000 stations devoted to jamming American

broadcasts, he said, but through technical developments, this country is able to beam its program so close to accepted Russian stations that one can't be jammed without jamming the other.

As a result, about 80 percent of American broadcasts reach areas outside Moscow and even in Moscow a patient listener can pick up the highlights.

Oregonians Warned Of Fireworks Purchasing

SALEM — (P) — Oregonians were warned by the state fire marshal today against buying fireworks by mail or express from out-of-state dealers.

State Fire Marshal Robert B. Taylor pointed out that the new legislative ban on fireworks applies to the selling, keeping and exploding of fireworks. The penalty is a maximum fine of \$500 and six months in jail.

Bishop Urges Culling Of Inferior Human Strains

LONDON — (P) — Birmingham's aging, outspoken bishop, Dr. E. W. Barnes, urged overcrowded countries like Britain to think about breeding out their inferior human strains.

To preserve inferior stocks as a population becomes excessive is to settle ourselves with an increasingly heavy social burden and probably lower the general quality of our people.

Gambling Charges Hit 11 Men In Clackamas

OREGON CITY — (P) — Eleven men were indicted on gambling charges by a Clackamas county grand jury.

The world, he declared, faces a "most unpleasant, difficult problem from which professional men, doctors, ecclesiastics, and politicians alike turn aside."

They include Lonnie Logsdon, owner of most of the slot machines seized in a mass raid two months ago. Others were operators and owners of the raided taverns and night spots.

"The defect remains. To eliminate it we must eliminate the stock where it has appeared. Is success in this elimination possible without sterilization or infanticide?"

The grand jury report hit sharply at police failure to weed out gambling earlier.

Friction between the state police and the sheriff's office contributed to a "noticeable lack of gambling law enforcement," it continued.

The city of Molalla was criticized for not halting gambling during the town's annual buckaroo.
