

## U.S., South Korean Forces Aided In Battle By 50,000 Men Of 16 Other Countries

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—(AP)—Unofficial figures indicate that more than 50,000 fighting men of 16 other nations are in the line with U. S. and Republic of Korea forces as the Korean war enters its 12th month.

The figures are incomplete here because the Pentagon declines to release them all, a U. S. delegation spokesman said.

But delegation sources in the U. N. and published figures combine to give a picture of the United Nations team that has just staved off another communist offensive in mid-Korea. The death stand of the British Gloucestershire regiment in blunting the newest drive centered fresh attention on what the U. N. Allies were doing.

The British force remains the largest, outside the U. S. and R. O. K. forces. U. S. ground forces are estimated at more than 250,000 men. A Korean government official last week said that the R. O. K. forces also number about 250,000 men.

Besides fighting Communists in Malaya and garrisoning Hong Kong, the British figure to have 13,000 fighting men in the line and another 10,000 tied up in air and naval forces in Korea. Two squadrons of Sunderlands, flying from an aircraft carrier, furnish the British air striking power there.

A fresh Canadian brigade has just landed in Korea, bringing to nearly 9,000 men Canadian ground force strength. The Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, which reached Korea last December, is now included in that figure.

In addition, Canada has in action three destroyers and a Royal Canadian air force squadron of 12 Thunderbird planes, with 1,000 men—pilots, crews, ground crews and maintenance men strung clear back to Alaska. Canadian-Pacific airlines makes two military trips from Victoria to Tokyo weekly and one flight westward. Private cargo vessels also have been shunted into the Pacific service to power the Canadian effort.

New ground force contributions within the last month have come from Ethiopia, which sent 1,070 warriors; Colombia, which has en route 400 infantry of a promised 1,080; and Cuba, whose offer of a company, about 200 men, has been accepted.

## Record Grasshopper Purge Tried With New Poison

WARNER SPRINGS, Calif.—(AP)—Possibly the biggest grasshopper purge ever undertaken with private capital is underway here. Out of this project of destruction may come new hope for western agriculture. Sam Smith of the federal division of grasshopper control, Denver, says a new poison being used seems to promise great things.

The poison is a mixture of orange pulp, bran and chlorodane and was developed in Lancaster, Calif.

Tons of the poison are being dropped by a fleet of seven planes operating on the Warner ranch.

They will continue their operations for a week. The cost of the grasshopper baiting, \$53,000, will be paid by the estate of the late George Sawday, pioneer San Diego county rancher.

"The entire west may be freed from the ravages of grasshoppers as a result of this project," Smith said.

Complete eradication may be possible, he indicated, over a two-year period. The sowing of poison is done during the period between hatching and growth of the grasshoppers' wings, when the insects are most voracious.
