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and royalty payments. This is intended to make sure that such income is reported by the taxpayers who receive it. Dividends paid by cooperatives to their members would not be subject to withholding.

Continuation of all existing depletion allowances granted the owners of oil wells and mines in figuring their incomes taxes. Sand, gravel, stone and some other non-metallic minerals were added to the list.

Special exemption from the capital gains tax on gains made on the sale of a personal dwelling place when the owner purchases a new home for his own use within a year. This provision would be retroactive to last Jan. 1.

Unmarried heads of families to receive one-half the income tax benefits available to married persons by reason of the income-splitting provision of the present tax laws.

An increase of one-eighth in the effective maximum rate of the capital gains tax, in line with the one-eighth (12½ percent) increase voted by the committee in individual income taxes. The capital gains rate will go up from 25 percent to 28 1-8 percent.

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McClure also called for renewed efforts by the milk industry to improve public relations.

"We must admit that bungling in our relations with the public... now has brought a threat that all milk marketing legislation may be repealed, with disastrous results to Oregon's important dairy industry," he said.

He advocated that Oregon State college and the extension service assist dairymen in the public relations program.

"Need for such a program was demonstrated at the last session of the legislature when the dairy industry was held up to public ridicule and seemed helpless to overcome such an adverse situation," he added.

He also urged the Grange to support the referendum attack on the school reorganization bill. He said the measure would eliminate many small elementary school districts and boards, and would undermine the school cost equalization program.

NO FUEHRER, NO COMPAH

HAMBURG, Germany — (AP) — The Socialist Reich party, frequently accused of neo-Nazism, wanted to play Hitler's favorite "Badenweiler" march at a party meeting in Essen.

Essen's mayor extricated himself by digging out an old Nazi law which has not been officially abolished.

The law says the "Badenweiler" may only be played in the presence of the fuhrer.

"Mining Claim Racket" Hail Sought By Assn.

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No mining claims will be patented in the next two years, Cooper averred, because the federal government is contesting the claims pending in the northwest — some 7,000 of them — and it will be several years before they are adjudicated.

Meanwhile, action taken in the last Oregon legislative session provided some protection in the form of a 25 percent severance tax on claims and patents which must be paid to the county. Cooper explained. Better protection is expected to be legislated in the next session.

Policies for granting grazing permits on national forest acreages are inconsistent, Cooper declared. There should be some review of the problems encountered and the range laws should be codified to eliminate confusion.

Water Rights Awarded

Other progress obtained through legislation in the last session toward preserving state's rights included a bill providing that anyone, including the federal government, would have to apply to the legislature for the use of public waters, rather than apply to the state engineer as was formerly the case, Cooper pointed out.

The engineer now will receive such applications only after the legislature has passed on them. Cooper said this measure was a blow against proposals for diverting Oregon water to California.

Chairman of the session was Judge Guy H. Forsyth of Curry county while officers of the association present included Commissioner L. V. Beckley, president, and Judge F. L. Phipps, The Dalles, executive secretary.

Douglas county representatives attending besides Beckley were Judge C. C. Hill, Commissioner E. R. Metzger and Engineers F. C. Frear and Wally Hector. Former Douglas county judge M. C. Bowker, and former commissioner, H. B. Roadman, were also present.

Cos county representatives included Judge James Harrison Jr., Commissioners Fred A. Kruse and F. C. True and Engineer Floyd Robb. Commissioner J. R. Yoakum represented Curry county in addition to Judge Forsyth; Jackson county was represented by Judge J. B. Coleman and Engineer Paul B. Rynning; and Josephine county had a delegation of three—Judge Raymond A. Lathrop, and Commissioners L. M. Mitchell and Fred Richards.

Congressman Penalized For Campaign "Kickback"

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Walter E. Brehm (R-Ohio) Monday received a suspended jail sentence of five to 15 months and was fined \$5,000 for illegally accepting \$1,000 in campaign gifts from his office.

The sentence was pronounced by Federal Judge Burnita S. Matthews before whom Brehm was convicted by a jury April 30.

Brehm, 58, now is serving his fifth term in Congress.

The Ohioan's attorneys have served notice they will appeal his conviction, so Brehm may remain free on bond, pending outcome of the appeal.

Brehm is not required to resign his house seat because he has been convicted of a crime. Only the House can remove one of its members.

Gen. MacArthur Dates Four-Day Tour Of Texas

AUSTIN, Tex. — (AP) — This capital of Texas will give Gen. Douglas MacArthur an engraved seal of the city and a rousing welcome when he starts his four-day visit of the state.

Houston, where he makes his second Texas appearance, has rolled out a Cadillac which will be given to him.

MacArthur will address a joint session of the Texas legislature on the state capitol steps.

affected with a refund from the "steal" of grazing fee funds, which amount to \$1,300,000; but the principle of the thing is more important than the money, said Cooper, armistice at the 38th parallel if it were a "real settlement" with a reasonable guarantee against new aggression.

Wedemeyer also told the committee:

1. He is in favor of letting Russia withdraw from the United Nations if she wanted to as a result of any cutting of diplomatic ties by the United States.

2. Mr. Truman was justified in ousting MacArthur if the President had "lost confidence in General MacArthur's capacity to carry out orders faithfully to the best of his ability." Wedemeyer said, however, that he and "I think most Americans feel unhappy about the way" the former Pacific commander was fired.

3. He would, as Senator Green (D-Rt) put it, have the United States "go it alone" if other United Nations members were unwilling to support the MacArthur Korean war program. But Wedemeyer declared he is for trying first in every instance to get U. N. support.

4. He believes the Formosa-based Chinese Nationalists "are not ready to conduct a major or significant operation" against the Communist-held China mainland, but that they could wage effective guerrilla warfare action in China.

Truman "Fakir," Ex-Rail Head Says

WASHINGTON — (AP) — William Jeffers, former railroad and government executive, says President Truman is a "fakir first class," using the Korean war as an excuse for a spending spree.

It was Jeffers' second blast at the President and his tax policies. Previously, he had charged that Mr. Truman was pouring his taxpayers' money "down a hundred rat holes" and had lost the people's confidence.

Both attacks were made in letters addressed to Vice-President Barkley and distributed to all members of the Senate, over which Barkley presides.

This man Truman, who is a fakir first and who is getting \$50,000 a year tax-free, which I consider highway robbery, is using the Korean situation as a device for all kinds of expenditures that have nothing to do with defense," Jeffers wrote in his latest letter, dated June 8.

Jeffers was the former head of the Union Pacific railroad and boss of the government rubber program during World War II.

In his first letters, on March 16, he complained that he was having a hard time making ends meet because federal taxes were taking about half of his pension.

Tickets will be cheaper this year, being \$2.50 for reserved seats, \$2.00 general admission and \$1.00 for children under 12 years.

The committee felt, said Fullerton, that, although attendance for the Sunday show last year was the greatest on record, the attendance could be still increased and the total revenue at least equalled if the admission price were reduced.

Crash Of 8 Jet Planes Ascribed To Icy Air

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The air force today ruled out sabotage and said icing of engine inlet screens caused the crash of eight jet fighters over Indiana last Friday.

The investigation conducted by the air force, the FBI, and air plane manufacturers has revealed "no indication of sabotage," the air force said.

The eight planes were among 34 F-84 Thunderjets flying from Austin, Tex., to Selfridge field, Mich. The eight crashed a few minutes after taking off after a refueling stop at Wright-Patterson field, Dayton, Ohio.

Three pilots were killed.

mitting price adjustments on sausage containing beef, the OPS said some manufacturers are having to pay more for certain types of beef they use. Boneless beef, widely used in making frankfurters, is an example.

An OPS official estimated the increase on hot dogs might amount to one to two cents a pound.

Some Sausage Exempt

The regulation provides a formula for price changes based on the percentage of beef used in the product. OPS said beef content varies with the manufacturer and the item.

The new ceiling will be based on new wholesale beef ceilings, rather than January prices. Primarily the regulation affects non-slaughtering who buy their beef at wholesale for processing.

Sausage manufacturers must obtain OPS approval for increases above one cent a pound for any product. If the increase is one cent or less it may be put into effect, but the manufacturer must keep record justifying the raise.

Sausage made wholly of pork is not affected, nor is the pork content of sausage containing beef and pork. Pork is not now under price control.
