NOLENSVILLE, Tenn. — (AP) — James Edward Lowe received his engineering degree at Vanderbilt university Sunday night. He had a job with an electrical contracting firm awaiting him.

The youth was killed on that job Monday — less than 16 hours after his graduation — while helping rewire a house.

Lowe's employer, James Neely of College Grove, said the 22-year-old Eagleville, Tenn., engineer died of electric shock when a power drill he was operating developed a short circuit.
