Women In Air Force Are Burning Over Appointment Of WAVE Officer

WASHINGTON (AP)—Women in the air force are doing a not-so-slow burn over the appointment of a WAVE reserve officer as director of the WAF.

And there's an awful fuss in the Pentagon powder rooms over just why the former director, Lt. Col. Geraldine "Jerry" May, resigned. Associates told a reporter that Col. May's "resignation for personal reasons" was a surprise not only to them, but to her. Colonel May declined to comment.

And the selection of Miss Mary Jo Shelly, a naval reservist, to head the WAF is interpreted in some quarters as a reflection on the abilities of the air force's 425 women officers to handle an expanding recruiting program. Col. Shelly, a former assistant to

the president of Bennington college, was sworn in last week. "It's carrying unification too far," said not a WAF but a WAVE. "President Truman should name an admiral to head the air force," commented a WAF.

Each asked that she not be identified by name. **Plans Expansion** The air force, junior to the army and navy, plans to expand its present 7,000-woman force to 48,000 by next June. It wants 18,000 more women than the army, the largest of the three services, seeks to recruit by then.

The air force said that in view of this anticipated WAF recruiting program "careful consideration was given to the selection of an individual whose experience and maturity would be best suited" for the director's job. It added:

"These individual personnel requirements were carefully measured against many available individuals, including lieutenant colonels now members of the WAF,

and it was determined that Col. Shelly was the best qualified individual for the assignment."

The girls in the air force concede they have no personal resentment against the new WAF director. She is well liked. And her record in the last war is outstanding. Like Colonel May she was one of the first women to volunteer back in 1942. She has been out of uniform since 1946.

Where's Career? "But they tell us on the idea of making a career out of joining the armed forces," said one WAF. "Well, if you can't get a shot at the top job in your own service, where's the career?"

In the background of the ruckus is a study of the WAF made by Jacqueline Cochran, wartime head of the civilian WASPS, cosmetician and wife of Floyd B. Odlum, financier. The famous woman flier was called in recently as a 90-day consultant to the air force.

She is credited with wanting to see the WAF's more streamlined. Among her recommendations made in February and just released by the air force is one that physical standards be made more stiff. The army now recruits for the WAF and WAF and she would have the WAF do its own.
