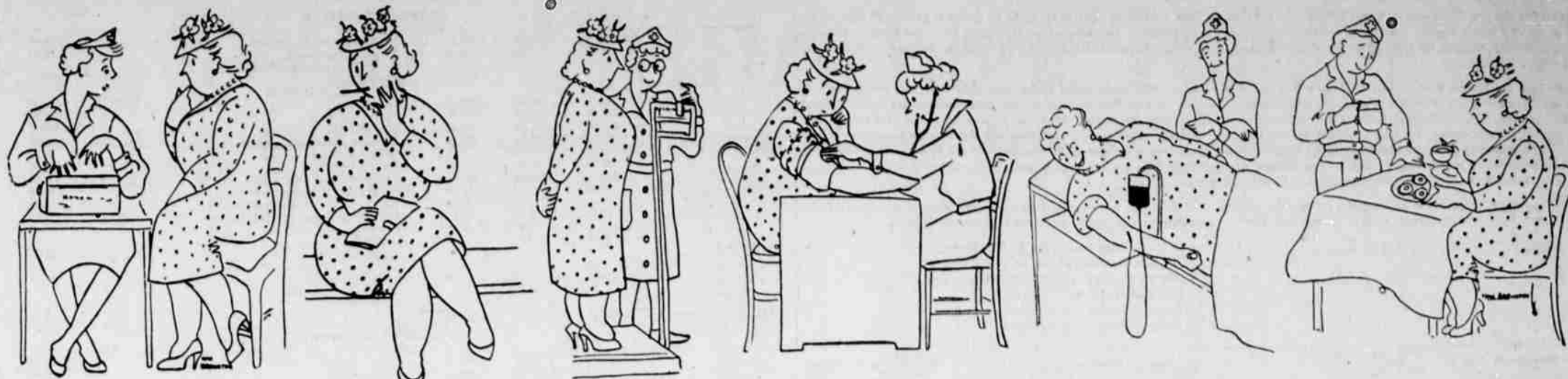

Blood Giving Called Easy; Advice: Do Not Put It Off

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will be in Roseburg Wednesday, June 20, at which time officials in charge here hope the response will be somewhat more satisfactory than heretofore.)

It's been a long, long time since we've appeared in print and it took something like the American Red Cross blood program to shake us into action.

Have you been down to give your blood? If you are putting it off till next week, next month, next year... don't. Do it now. It's so desperately needed.

Are you scared? Well, don't be. We were scared purple and shook so we fairly fell off the scales. It is the friendliest experience to even enter the Blood Center. Everyone so cheerful and pleasant... it didn't even hurt to give our age. If we hadn't been in the pink the Red Cross wouldn't have accepted our blood. Two reasons why... one is on account of our own well being... the other is on account of the person who receives our blood.

Blood Flow Fascinates
They ask lots of questions and check you carefully... weight, temperature, blood pressure...

then you sip some fruit juice... at this point we began to worry over whether the next step, giving blood would hurt. It didn't. We gazed with wrapt fascination as the live-giving blood was drawn from our arm and commented on its beautiful rich color to the amusement of the nurses. But, to us, it was beautiful!

In the adjoining room we rested a few minutes and then had coffee and doughnuts... They gave us a little pin, like a drop of red blood to wear... and I was not quite so proud of any piece of jewelry.

Public Indifference Cited
Who are we to make an appeal to you who have put off going to the Blood Center? We are just average housewives and mothers who want to do a lot... feel ashamed of all the comforts we have... when there is so much suffering and separation.

How do you feel when you see industries going off for the first time? It isn't pleasant, is it? How do you feel when you see that special look in a man's eyes and he tells you that good-looking youngster who was drafted last summer is in the thick of it in Korea?

One hour of your time... one pint of your blood to help save some life... will make you feel much, much nicer about yourself. We KNOW.

Top United States Scientist States That Atomic Bomb Is Now Obsolete

NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—A top scientist of the Atomic Energy commission (AEC) was quoted as saying the atomic bomb is obsolete.

How literally that was meant or what relation it might have to efforts of the U. S. to create a hydrogen bomb was not clear.

Rep. F. Edward Hebert (D-La.) mentioned the matter today in the third of a series of articles on the Eniwetok tests written for the New Orleans States. The States made them available to the Associated Press. The scientist was Dr. Edward Teller, physicist of the AEC's Los Alamos, N. M., bomb laboratory and one of the men who helped develop the first atomic bomb. Hebert was telling of a chat among several officials and himself while he was at Eniwetok for atomic tests in April and May.

Hebert said he had remarked that the New Orleans airport, when built in 1933, was the most modern in the United States but now is obsolete. Thereupon, Hebert related, Dr. Teller commented: "That's nothing. In 1934 nobody had ever heard of the atom bomb and today it is obsolete."

Hebert, in the first of his series on Thursday, made an oblique reference to what appeared to be a phase of the atomic bomb test concerned with the hydrogen bomb research program. He was describing the cloud which formed after the explosion he witnessed. He wrote: "That cloud would go around the world several times before it dissipated."

Japanese Officer Finally Convinced Pacific War Over

AGANA, Guam — (P) — Convinced after nearly six years that the Pacific war is over, a Japanese petty officer has come out of his hideout on remote Anatahan island.

But 18 other Japanese sailors and soldiers, with a single machinegun, remains on the island 61 miles north of Saipan.

Navy headquarters here said Saturday Junji Inoue, 43, an engineer in the imperial navy, was taken of Anatahan a week ago. More than 200 letters from wives, mothers and relatives of the remaining Japanese were left there, urging the men to believe war

with the U. S. had ended and to return home.

Inoue received such letters a year ago and had been waiting to be picked up since. Now at Saipan for rest and medical observation, he soon will be flown to Guam and then returned to his family at Hiji-shi, a small farming village near Kobe. His wife and two children live there.

Cargo Ship Survivors
Inoue said he and the 18 others were the only survivors of 33 marooned on Anatahan June 12, 1944, when American dive bombers sank three 30-ton cargo ships in the island's harbor.

Eight of the original group were murdered, Inoue said, and others died accidental deaths. He added that the group now is dominated by seaman Nakagawa Ichiro, who threatens to kill anyone attempting to leave.

Inoue stepped out of the brush to be picked up by the trust territory tug Venus, commanded by Lt. Cmdr. James B. Johnson of Birmingham, Ala. He wore a nylon shirt and pants fashioned from parachutes salvaged from a B-29 crash in 1944.

Salvage from the bomber provided the men with most of the implements needed to survive on the island. They ate lizards, coco-

nuts, crabs, mangoes and bananas, Inoue said.

Reemployment Rights Given Korean Veterans

Members of reserve units who were called to active duty because of the emergency in the Far East and are now being released from

active duty are entitled to the same reemployment rights as men released from service after World War II. This privilege is guaranteed under the Selective Service Act of 1948.

The act provides that reserve personnel ordered to extended active duty after July 24, 1948 are entitled to reemployment rights if they are released from active duty

within three years of the date they went on active duty, or as soon thereafter as they can obtain release orders.

Under pending Universal Military Training and Service legislation, the Marine Corps expects that the period of three years duty will be lengthened to four.

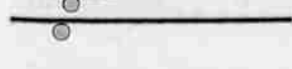
