

Brush Fire Extinguished Near Douglas County Line

A brush fire near the Lane-Douglas county line on the old territorial highway was quelled last night by the combined efforts of the Western Lane fire patrol and Douglas County Protective association.

The blaze started near the road in a logged off area and burned over three quarters of an acre. Men from the Elk Creek crew and two wardens from Douglas county and a pumper truck and crew from Western Lane cooperated in confining the fire.

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alive with Red activity. A corps spokesman said the Communists may be building up there for a new offensive.

Eighty miles to the northwest Communist shore batteries fought an hour and a half artillery duel with besieging United Nations warships.

The shore-to-sea battle erupted at Wonsan, east coast port besieged more than four months. Accurate Red fire burst close to U.N. warships and shrapnel splattered on the decks.

Marine Corsair fighter planes and naval gunfire silenced the shore batteries.

American planes swept freely through a cloudless sky and hammered Reds across North Korea. Four U. N. planes were shot down Monday.

U. N. patrols fanned out along the front. They met little opposition Monday except in the central sector around Kumhwa, eastern anchor of the Iron Triangle. Tank traps and mine fields were their greatest problem.

U. N. forces were augmented by the arrival in Japan of the largest Canadian contingent since May. Its size was a secret.

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cab, and with \$975 allowance on the old sweeper.

Since a number of factors are to be considered in the type of equipment which will best serve the city's need, the price alone does not determine the equipment to be purchased. Some offer additional features, such as open or closed cabs and special equipment, which must figure in the price. Mayor Fiegel pointed out in referring the bids to the city manager and committees.

A consent petition by the property owners concerned was submitted asking for annexation of lots 1, 2, 3 and four in block 4, and 5 1/2 acres in block 6, all in Beulah's addition.

Petitions were also presented asking that So. Hamilton street between Rice and Main be oiled, with the property owners paying the cost. The petition contained 19 names. Another petition with nine names asked for a survey to determine the cost of regrading and paving of South Hamilton from Roberts to Rice street. The petitions were referred to the city manager for study.

Whether the city is empowered to restrict the number of taxicabs operating in the city was discussed in application by D. K. Dunham for a permit. City Attorney Paul Geddes, interpreting the existing ordinance, said the city could restrict the number of taxis. At present only one taxi company is operating in the city, following recent purchase of the other company's interest. The purpose of regulation stems from service, and whether too many taxis would make it unprofitable for any to operate. The council stood on its original rejection, adopting a policy of not issuing any more licenses until the end of the current year.

The council voted not to increase pensions for former employees who have retired. The recent state legislature made it possible for this to be done by the cities if they so desired by increasing the city's contribution.

The city manager reported streets in West Roseburg have been oiled, with the exception of Balif, Harrison and Umpqua. Umpqua and Harrison will be oiled as soon as the city obtains new teeth for the scarifier equipment. Balif is being delayed until storm sewers down that street are installed.

Letting of a contract for the storm sewers in West Roseburg is still being delayed, pending negotiations for settlement of an original contract let to Atlas Construction Co. A special meeting will be called in a few days to award the contract to one of the bidders.

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Coast Highway Lookouts Manned

The Lower Umpqua chamber of commerce unanimously went on record June 11 as favoring a proposed improvement of highway 38 on the coast in which a new stretch of road would be built at water level grade from Reedsport to Kopeke slough, according to the Port Umpqua Courier.

The plan was advanced by Howard Hinsdale of the Port commission at a chamber of commerce meeting.

Representatives of the State Highway commission are in Reedsport today to study plans for the proposed highway and visit the area where it is planned.

Hinsdale argued that the new road would eliminate the hazardous, narrow, curving strip of highway now existing and 2,400 feet of five percent grade. This would make it the only near water level grade highway from the coast to the valley.

The proposed highway would be 1,200 feet shorter than the present one, which would affect a saving of about \$65,000 to the Highway commission. An additional \$65,000 would be saved by eliminating the five percent grade, said Hinsdale.

Sheriff Reuben Lyons has arrested 29 persons, including 12 on murder charges. About 300 members of the CIO Textile Workers union of America went on strike May 31 after union and management were unable to agree on a contract.

A strike at the Goodyear Tire & Rubber company in Akron, Ohio, appeared to be ending. Workers began to return to the No. 2 plant, where 1,250 had been idle for a week in a dispute involving complaints about working conditions.

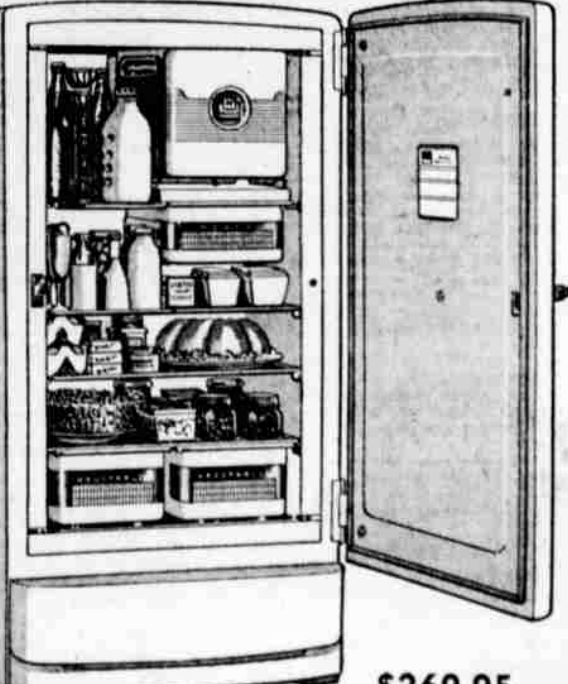
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
