three associates of George Washington university school of medicine and Mt. Alto Veterans' Administration hospital.

They reported evidence which they said suggested the possibility that the whole class of "rheumatic diseases" — probably the major cause of chronic illness in America today — may be due to an unusual type of microbe, called an "I. organism."

This concept, they declared, may alter sharply the current concept that such diseases are primarily due to a deficiency of some substance produced in the body tissue.

an explanation of why the drugs an explanation of why the drugs ACTH and cortisone, which have shown promise in the control of certain rheumatic ills, produce temporary effect and therefore must be administered regularly. If further research, establishes that a specific germ is involved in rheumatic disease, they said, the way would then be open to possible direct attack with drugs for the prevention of a full-blown attack or the overcoming of established or the overcoming of established

symptoms.


