

Sentence Stays Denied Top Reds

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States' 11 homegrown Communist leaders who were convicted of teaching the violent overthrow of their government may begin their prison terms early next month.

Justice Jackson, of the supreme court, late yesterday denied their pleas for stay of sentence until the high court gets back next fall from its summer recess.

The convicted men are Eugene Dennis, general secretary of the Communist party of the United States and his ten chief advisers. Together, they form the "politburo"—executive council—of communism in the United States. Dennis and nine others got sentences of five years and \$10,000 fine. The eleventh, R. G. Thompson, drew a three year sentence, in view of his war record in the Pacific, and \$10,000 fine.

Jackson considered the request for stay of sentence. He said it was "beyond belief" the high court would change its views. He therefore ordered sentences executed without delay.

Forgery, Non-Support Bring Court Sentences

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly Friday sentenced one man to two years in the state penitentiary on a forgery charge, and placed another on probation on a non-support charge.

Robert F. Morse, 22, of Canby, had been arraigned in circuit court Wednesday and pleaded guilty to passing a \$55 bad check. He was given two years.

Emmit Meek, Roseburg barber, sentenced to a year in the state penitentiary, was placed on probation.

Jury Gives Defendant Verdict In Money Suit

A circuit court jury Friday returned a verdict in favor of the defendant in a civil suit filed by Minnette M. Bells against Percy M. Varney to recover money alleged to have been advanced to the defendant for the purchase of an auto.

Two new suits were filed in court Friday.

Arthur C. Glock asked \$35,000 general damages in a suit filed Friday against Earl L. Davenport. Glock's complaint stated he received permanent injuries from an auto collision November 17, 1950 between him and the defendant.

The collision was said to have taken place while Glock was driving from Scottsburg to Reedsport. Nordling Parts, Inc., filed suit Friday to recover \$683.09 alleged to have been unpaid by M. H. Kenney.

Oil Dispute Set For Court Entry

The International Court of Justice at The Hague — judicial arm of the United Nations — stepped into the critical Anglo-Iranian oil dispute today. It will begin hearings next Saturday.

Britain requested the World court to intervene after its negotiations with Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's nationalist government broke down this week.

The Iranians pushed ahead with their "no compromise" move to nationalize the rich Persian oil resources, forcing out British control of oil production in that Middle East country.

Oil apparently still was flowing from the Anglo-Iranian oil company's refineries at the south Iranian city of Abadan. But an Iranian government-appointed commission was in control of the British-owned company's offices.

Morse Is 'Eisenhower' Man, He Says In Speech

EUGENE — (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse declared yesterday that he is an "Eisenhower man." And if he won't run, Oregon's junior senator wants to see Paul Hoffman as his party choice for President in 1952.

Home for three days of rest, Morse busied himself yesterday stringing wire for a new electric fence on his College Crest farm. He gave an address last night on the University of Oregon campus and also spoke informally to chamber of commerce managers in convention here.

Morse was critical of the Republican majority in Congress and declared: "The 82nd Congress, more than any other Congress in 25 years can be called a do-nothing Congress."

Reaction To Lewis Mixed

DETROIT — (AP) — Snubs and cheers from the CIO United Automobile Workers awaited John L. Lewis, boss of the independent United Mine Workers, and a founder of the CIO, here today. It was the controversial Lewis' first trip to this highly unionized city in 11 years, and he came to address a meeting which the UAW international board instructed its members and top officials to skip.

Officers Elected By Girls' State

SALEM — (AP) — K' Lynn Brumbough of Gresham was elected governor of the Girls' State, sponsored by the American Legion auxiliary.

She defeated Pat Wuner of Grants Pass. Miss Brumbough was a last-minute nominee, taking the place of Honey Gilmer, also of Grants Pass who was removed to the hospital Wednesday night for an emergency appendicitis operation.

The winners were sworn in in the senate chambers with Governor Douglas McKay officiating.

Other officers elected were: Madelon Michaelson, Tigard, secretary of state; Marijo Stump, Prineville, state treasurer; Marilyn Manser, Portland, attorney general; Hanna Sue Hansen, Grants Pass, labor commissioner; Gerianne Porritt, Eugene, superintendent of public instruction; Jean Hartwell, Salem, chief justice; and Arta Ohling, Albany, Gertrude Gilmore, Toledo, and Norma Thorne, Portland, associate justices.

Sue Ross, Eugene, is speaker of the House, and Janet Yut, Portland, was elected president of the Senate.

Congress' Ethics Worst, Says Ickes

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Harold L. Ickes, the self-styled "old curmudgeon," pointed a finger at Congress Friday as the branch of government which could stand the biggest improvement in ethical standards.

He tossed a verbal harpoon, too, in the direction of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

The former secretary of Interior told a senate labor subcommittee conducting a hearing on ethics in government that "the most important question" before the group is: "The loss of confidence in Congress as the result of acts of its members either of commission or omission."

The subcommittee is holding hearings on a proposal to establish a commission which would draw up a code of moral and ethical standards for government employees.

Ickes, who resigned from the cabinet after several years of strained relations with President Truman, said "the overwhelming mass" of federal workers were "honest and faithful." He reserved his sharpest criticism for the lawmakers.

He took the three men to Winston, where Billy Mohr's ambulance was called and the injured taken to the hospital.

Harrington's death was witnessed by shovel operator, Wayne Christensen of Riddle, who was unable, because of the noise, to warn him.

Traffic had been stopped while a Le Tourneau drive, dirt-mover was pushing a small tree. The machine was operated by Hubert Brown of Canyonville.

Steps Behind Machine The work was stopped long enough for traffic to pass through, then the machine made a sharp turn to continue shoving the tree out of the way. Harrington, in checking on the traffic, stepped behind the backing machine, which ran over his body.

Harrington's body was taken to Long & Orr mortuary, while Reimann's body was taken to Roseburg Funeral home.

Harrington was born at Fairfax, Mo., Aug. 23, 1897, and enlisted in the U. S. army, serving as private first class in the medical department during World War I. He was married at Vancouver, Wash., in 1938 to Mildred Golden Driver and had been a resident of Canyonville since 1943.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Mildred Harrington, and five step-children, Homer (Jerry) Driver, Lynwood, Calif., Mrs. C. A. (Lucille) Trone, Mrs. W. L. (Lillie) Carter and Mrs. M. C. (Louise) Biddington, all of Roseburg, and Mrs. Aldo (Ruth) Bianca, Fallon, Nev.; two brothers, Clarence Harrington, Whittier, Calif., and Dick Harrington, Palmdale, Calif., and by two sisters, Mrs. Inez Bentley, Sabetha, Kan., and Mrs. Iva Helms, Long Beach, Calif.

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O. & C. Fund Long Held In Escrow Sought By Lane

An 8-year-old controversy which could bring as much as \$625,000 federal funds to Douglas county and up to \$2,500,000 to 18 Oregon counties has been revived by the Lane county court.

An Associated Press dispatch Friday from Eugene reported the Lane court has asked J. R. Bruckart, Willamette National forest supervisor, to help in obtaining the county's share of up to \$5,000,000 in controverted timber land funds, Oregon's congressional delegation has also been asked to assist.

Dispute Over Lands

The controverted timber land fund resulted from a dispute over scattered lands between the National Forest service and the Oregon and California land grant administration. The dispute ended in a stalemate in 1943.

The Forest service now administers the disputed land, some 482,000 acres in 18 counties, and makes timber sales subject to the approval of the O. & C.

Lynn Beckley, Douglas county commissioner and president of the Association of Oregon Counties, estimated the total fund now held in escrow is somewhere between four and five million dollars.

Counties Shorted

The counties thus far have not received their share of the receipts from the sale of timber of the disputed areas. If the lands belong to the O. & C. administration, the counties would be entitled to 30 percent of the fund. If the Forest service wins the dispute, the counties would be entitled to 25 percent.

Beckley said Douglas county's share of the fund would be approximately a fourth of the total — between \$500,000 and \$625,000 — if the lands belong to the O. & C. If they are Forest service lands, the amount the county receives would depend on the sales of timber from the disputed area.

Robert Aufderheide, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest, said receipts from the controverted lands in the Umpqua forest are now \$1,037,000. However approximately a fifth of the Umpqua forest is in Lane county.

County Meeting Set

Commissioner Beckley said a meeting of all Oregon counties containing O. & C. lands would be held in Portland in the near future to discuss the controversy.

The Lane county court suggested that the counties be granted a present share of 25 percent of the funds. Then if O. & C. should win control of the lands later, the counties could be given the additional 25 percent.

The suggestion has also been made by the Forest service, Aufderheide said.

Five Argentine Officers Arrested On Plot Charge

BUENOS AIRES — (AP) — Five Argentine army officers are under arrest charged with trying to stir a revolt against the government.

Announcement of the arrests came on the heels of press reports that a plot was afoot to assassinate President Juan D. Peron and his wife.

The Army ministry said last night the five officers were arrested in connection with an investigation of military personnel believed involved in "a plan to create confusion and disrupt public order." The probe, it said, "had been disclosed in the newspapers."

The morning paper El Mundo said all five had confessed. The army had no immediate comment on this report.

DEWEY SETS TRIP

ALBANY, N. Y. — (AP) — Governor Thomas E. Dewey will fly to the Korean warfront early next month as part of a 25,000-mile tour of critical areas in the Pacific.

The twice-defeated Republican candidate for President announced today he would leave July 1 by plane and would be away a month.

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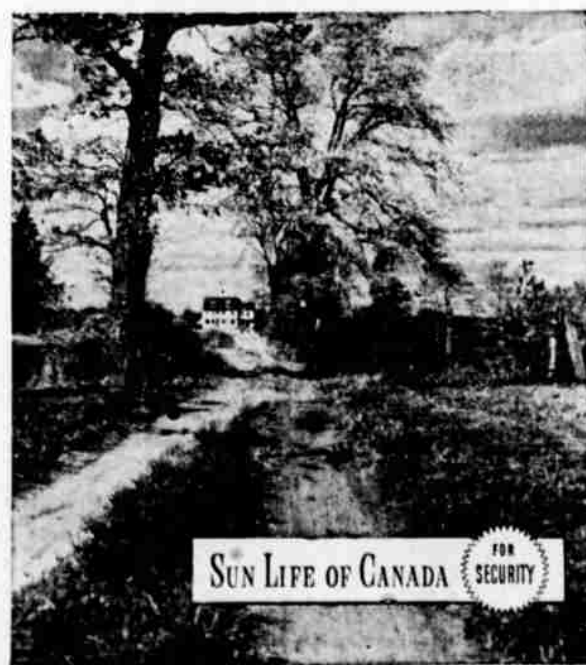
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
