Address On Korea Given At Rotary By Dr. Pearson

At the Rotary meeting Thursday at the Umpqua hotel, Dr. R. W. Pearson, local physician who spent many years in Korea and other parts of the Orient, gave an account of some of his experiences and observations.

Korea is one of the oldest nations in the world, he said, with a history dating back as far as King David.

Dr. Pearson was the director of an 150-bed hospital in Seoul, only about 30 miles south of the 38th parallel.

"Koreans learned corruption from the Americans," he said, rapping disparaging remarks made about some Koreans by some Americans.

Dr. Pearson narrowly escaped invading North Koreans as he boarded a plane which was evacuating the last group from Seoul.

Planes strafed the caravan of vehicles just before it reached the airport, he said.

Dr. Pearson predicted that with the termination of hostilities, a long list of atrocities committed by the Reds would be revealed.

"I am very glad," said Dr. Pearson, "that there are Americans who are willing to forfeit wealth, reputation and name to do something to save America."

He believed that was why Gen. Douglas MacArthur came back to this country.

Dairy Month Cited

Calvin Baird pointed out, in a brief talk, that June is annual dairy month and also marks the centennial anniversary for the extensive production of ice cream.

He said that the Umpqua dairy is a great asset to Roseburg with 35 employees who are paid \$150,000 total annual payroll. But there is insufficient dairy operation in this area with the result that \$200,000 goes to Josephine county annually, he added.

Dismissed was a suit brought against Wayne Kaylor and Diamond Martin by Elwin DeGnath, who had asked \$25,000 general and \$9,600 special damages, alleging he had been injured in a logging accident while working for the defendants.

The other dismissal was a suit filed by the Roseburg Lumber company against Donald E. Weber and Homer Bondy. The suit grew out of a logging truck collision south of Sutherlin Dec. 23, 1949.

Fire Guard School Will End Today

A week-long fire guard training school, conducted by Umpqua National forest rangers at the Wolf Creek forest ranger station on Little river, was concluded Friday.

Total of 44 youths are being trained in communications, map and compass reading, other phases of forestry and given actual experience in fire fighting.

The first two days of the session were devoted to timber management training and fire training of timber management personnel and the engineering staff. The last three days were devoted to training of the fire guards.

The Umpqua forest's permanent contingent of about 50 men will be increased to around 150, with about 40 of these stationed as lookouts and others on fire guard and trail work.

While a few lookouts are already out, others will be placed this weekend. The forests are very dry for this time of the year, according to Robert Aufderheide, Umpqua forest supervisor.
