Truman Signs New Draft Law

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman has signed the new draft law.

The measure lowers the draft age, extends the selective service system four years and lays the foundation for universal military training.

The new law keeps the draft in operation until July 1, 1953, and permits the induction of 18½-year-olds for military service if local draft boards exhaust the supply of older eligible men. It makes no change in the present maximum draft age of 25.

The period of service under the new law is 24 months instead of the 21 under the expiring law.

Although the minimum induction age under the new law is 18½ years, men still must register when they become 18.

The new law makes draft-age aliens liable to service if they desire permanent residence; reduces mental and physical standards for acceptance for service; puts a new top of 5,000,000 men on the overall size of the armed forces; and permits the induction of eligible men whose sole dependents are their wives.

It provides for appointment of a five-man commission to recommend to Congress a system of universal military training for 18-year-olds.

Bride Of 10 Days Victim Of Abduction And Attack

ARLINGTON, Va. — (AP) — A 20-year-old bride was kidnapped early today from her bedroom by two young gunmen, who, she said, took her 10 miles to a riverside park, raped her four times and attempted to shoot her.

Police said the shooting attempt failed only because the kidnappers' rifle misfired.

The pretty victim was Mrs. Nancy Hotchkiss, wife of navy Ensign James Hotchkiss and member of a socially prominent Winnetka, Ill., family. They were married 10 days ago and had been living in their first-floor apartment only a couple of days.

After the attacks, Mrs. Hotchkiss was driven to the vicinity of her home and dumped out of her abductors' car. Within four hours, police seized two suspects and said they admitted the crimes.

ern Lane county to unauthorized entry, and logging was stopped in the Tillamook burn.

In the Willamette National forest, 32 miles east of Eugene, lines were around the 700-acre Hebe creek fire. Fire dispatcher Guy Johnson said in Portland there was every reason to hope the lines would hold although the weather remained a threat. Three hundred men were working to keep the fire in hand.

The weather bureau's fire forecast said northwest Oregon's hazard was eased today with humidities around 35 percent in the northern Willamette valley, but 25 percent in the southern part. In southwestern and south central Oregon, humidities were slated to stay at 15 to 25 percent.

It reported some chance of afternoon thunder storms over the Cascades.

TRUTH OR CONSEQUENCES
 N. M. — (AP) — More than 30,000 acres of timber lay in ashes today as a fire in the Gila National forest in New Mexico raged uncontrolled for the fifth day.

At least 1,200 men were on the fire lines attempting to draw them tight around the 60 to 70-mile front. Most of the lines must be dug by hand since the fire lays in the nearly impassable Black Mountain region 45 miles southeast of Truth of Consequences.

Telephone Strike Hits Cities Of West Coast

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Federal negotiators pressed today for quick settlement of the one-day-old strike of 9,500 southern California employees of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co.

Meanwhile, the walkout threatened to spread to the Pacific Northwest.

Spokesmen for the CIO Communications Workers of America said that "quickie strikes" Monday in St. Helens, and Portland, Ore., were in protest against delays in getting a new contract. Several strikers at St. Helens were replaced and scores walked off the job in Portland.

The workers' pay scales range from \$36 to \$83 weekly. The company offered a 10 percent wage increase asked by the union but matters of seniority, grievance procedure, job classifications, a no strike clause and retroactivity stalled attempts to settle the strike.

Baltimore Solves Racial Segregation

BALTIMORE — (AP) — Racial segregation at Baltimore's four municipal golf courses will end July 10 and Negroes and whites will be permitted to compete with one another in tennis matches and other athletic events under certain conditions.

The park board voted to maintain segregated tennis courts but to set aside a number of courts for mixed play.

It also voted to continue segregation at city playgrounds but to permit "supervised mixed play on some playgrounds."

The present policy of permitting whites to use Fort Smallwood beach on the first 20 days of each month remains in effect. Negroes have exclusive use of the beach for the rest of the month.

Six city pools will continue to be used by whites, and Negroes only will be permitted on the seventh.

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Heroism Of GI Saves Field Artillery Unit

WITH U. S. 35th DIVISION, Korea — (AP) — A direct enemy hit set fire to a U. S. howitzer tractor loaded with 24 rounds of high explosive shells and 130 gallons of gasoline.

It was within easy range of at least 50 men of a field artillery battalion.

Sgt. Walter Frazier, East Brdgy, Pa., jumped into another tractor, hooked on to the flaming vehicle and towed it a safe distance.

He dived back into his foxhole just as the first of the 155-millimeter shells on the burning tractor began to explode.

Not a man in the battalion was injured when the lot went up with a bang.

Italy Grants U.S. War Supply Base

ROME — (AP) — The Communist-ruled Italian port of Leghorn (Livorno) is to become the supply base for U. S. occupation forces in Austria, informed sources said.

Italy's Communist press immediately launched a bitter attack against letting America use Leghorn, whose local administration is Communist.

Use of Leghorn as a supply port would insure the lifeline of American occupation forces in Austria against any possible Russian attack across Germany.

The German port of Bremen now is the Austrian supply base. The route from Bremen to Austria easily could be severed in the event of Soviet aggression.

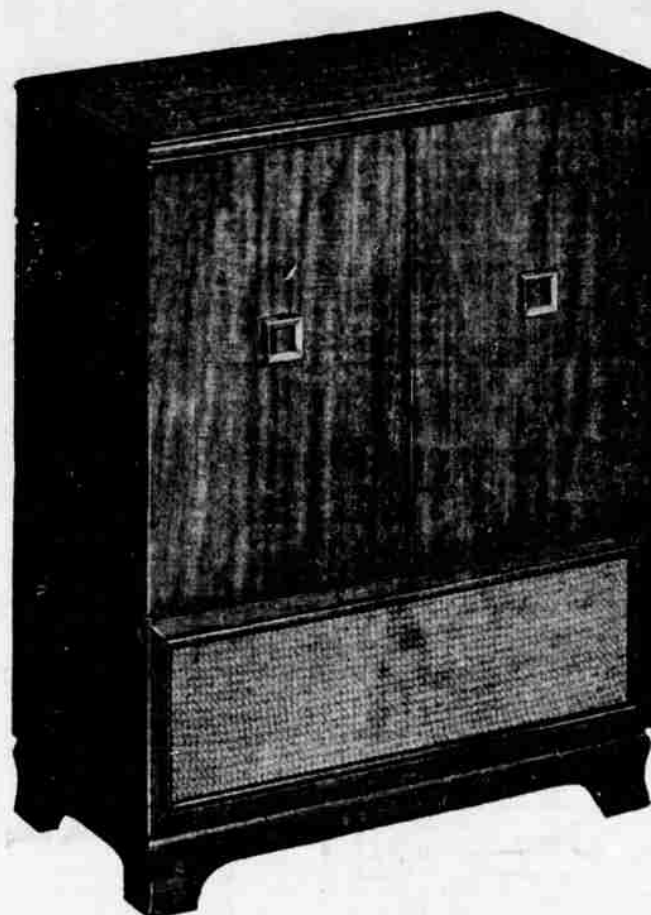
Use of Leghorn also will shorten the present supply route by 150 miles.

It is generally believed that in case of a Russian attack in Austria, allied occupation forces would fall back on the rugged mountains around the Brenner pass. The pass leads from Austria to Italy. Leghorn would be an ideal supply base for military forces operating in that mountain area.

While Leghorn's local administration is Communist, qualified sources said the majority of the dockworkers who would be unloading American supplies are not Reds.

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
