## Sewage Plant, Bond Bids Dated At Myrtle Creek

Bids for the construction of a sewage treatment plant in Myrtle Creek will be received at the city hall there until noon, July 20, according to the Daily Journal of Commerce, Portland. Myrtle Creek city Recorder G. D. Myllenebeck made the announcement.

Bids on a \$320,000 issue of general obligation bonds to finance construction of the plant and sewers throughout the town will also be opened the evening of the same day.

H. C. Werner of Eugene was low bidder on the sewer project but award of the contract has been postponed pending sale of the bonds. Sewer bids were opened earlier.

The proposed treatment plant is designed to furnish complete treatment for a population of about 3,000. The contract also calls for construction of one raw sewage pumping station.

If suitable bids are obtained, work is scheduled to start soon on the project which will give Myrtle Creek its first complete sewage system.

Besides the operating building, plans call for a digester, primary and secondary rectangular clarifier, sludge drying beds and trickling filter. Threatened wastes will be discharged into the South Umpqua river.

Informal requests have been asked on project equipment consisting of sewage pumps, chlorinator, sludge pump, clarifier mechanism and trickling filter distributor. Quotations will be received in the city hall, July 6.

bonds sold previously for the project necessitating a new sale. This time all funds will be raised from general obligation bonds in hopes that a better market can be found by investment houses that purchase municipal bonds.

Plans and specifications for the system were prepared by consulting engineers Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield of Corvallis.

## Cotton Bidding Boosts Negroes' Wages

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — (AP) — The man with the hoe — an economic problem most of the year — is making "big money" right now. Cotton belt farmers are bidding against each other for Negro field hands to chop the grass out of their crop.

Mrs. Clara Kitts, director of the Tennessee farm labor office here, said chopping wages have soared to \$10 a day in some areas — more than double last year's top.

About 13,000 choppers are being hired out of Memphis daily.

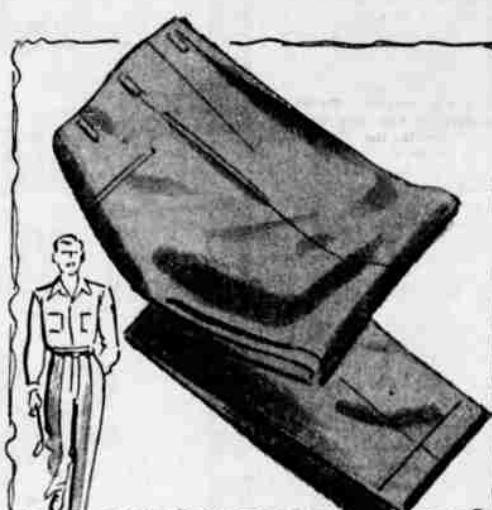

## U.S. Friendship Avowal Includes Russians

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Congressional action has been completed on a resolution affirming U. S. friendship "for all other peoples" including the Russians.

The measure, which does not require presidential approval, requests President Truman to call upon the Soviet government "to acquaint the peoples of the Soviet Union with the contents of this resolution."

The House approved the resolution by a vote of 349 to 6.
