

Trout Fishing On Umpqua Reported Good

Fishing is better than ever. This was the report from the local bureau of the state fish and game commission Wednesday afternoon regarding trout fishing on the Umpqua.

The official report states: "Trout angling very good. It has been very good in the North Umpqua above Winchester and in the South Umpqua above Milo. The North river is clear, but the South Umpqua is muddy below Tiller. Flies and spinners with bait have been the favorite lures. A few summer steelhead are present in the Steamboat area of the North Umpqua but only scattered catches have been made."

Fishermen going to try their luck at the coast will find the trout fishing falling off because of low water and rising water temperatures in the coastal lakes and streams, the report says. Salmon fishing at Winchester Bay, however, is good when it is possible to cross the bar. The report advises fishermen to be extremely cautious especially on an ebbing tide. Spiny ray fishing continues good on the coastal lakes. Striper

fishing on the Umpqua and Smith rivers is poor.

Yields Fine Catches

On further investigation of the North Umpqua situation, it was reported by State Policeman John M. Burkhardt, fish and game inspector in that region, that the newly restocked river is yielding fine catches. He said that the trout are biting on eggs, flies, wobble-rights and almost anything else. He continued that not everyone is catching the limit, but no one is returning empty handed.

Information received at the J. V. Sporting Goods store reveals that "outside trolling" at the coast was good last weekend. Earl Sargent corroborated this report. He caught a 35-pound ling cod off Charleston Beach at the mouth of Coos Bay, using a plug and double spinner.

Returning from a trip to Reedsport and Winchester Bay Tuesday, fish and game man Burkhardt said schools of salmon had been spotted by plane outside the bar. He said fog and treacherous tides were hampering fishing operations, however.

According to other information

from the J. V. Sporting Goods store, catfishing is "very good" at Lake Tachenitch. Bass fishing has not been good. On Diamond Lake flatfish are being snagged by fast trolling.

Salem Senators Beat Wenatchee

Bill Stevens, ex-New York Yankee hurler now pitching for Salem of the Western International baseball league, tossed a three-hitter at Wenatchee last night as the Senators walked to an 8-0 victory over the Chiefs.

The shutout was one of four top-notch hurling jobs turned in during the evening.

Stevens struck out five, walked none and reeled off seven hitless innings after Wenatchee countered two hits in the first inning and one in the second. Of the three Wenatchee hits, two were erased on double plays as Stevens faced but 23 hitters over the nine innings.

Another horn in the side of the hitters was Bob Snyder, Vancouver hurler, who let the Yakima Bears down with five hits at Vancouver as the league-leading Vancouver Capilanos edged Yakima 2 to 1.

Snyder, the league's winningest pitcher with a 15-2 record; also drove in the winning run in the fifth on a single.

Jim Frost, of Victoria was more generous with his hits. He gave up eight to the Tri-City Braves as the Athletics took a 10 to 1 decision at Victoria.

Bill White and Hal Jackson, each with a triple, double, and two singles paced the 17-hit Victoria assault.

At Spokane, the Spokane Indians defeated the Tacoma Tigers 10 to 6, thanks to six-hit chucking by Jim Marshall. Marshall had one bad inning. The Tigers scored four runs in the fourth on three walks, an error and two singles.

Budge Patty Whipped In Tennis Tournament

WIMBLEDON — (AP) — Hamilton Richardson of Baton Rouge, La., the American national junior champion, defeated Budge Patty of Los Angeles, the defending Wimbledon champion, 4-6, 6-3, 4-6, 10-8, 6-4, in their second round match today. The defeat of Patty, who was seeded fourth in the tournament, came after all of the other nine seeded players, including four Americans, had passed safely through their second round tests.

Golfers Hold Below Par On Oakmont Course

OAKMONT, Pa. — (AP) — The score of Oakmont is no more.

This historic course, which down through the years has withstood the onslaughts of the world's finest golfers to become noted as the nation's toughest test, has finally taken a beating.

Oakmont's old man par — he's 72 — yielded to a half-dozen of the 140 starters in yesterday's opening qualifying round in the 33rd PGA championship, and five others in the last field finished even with him.

Out in front by two strokes with a 34-35-39, despite losing two strokes on the 15th hole, was big Jim Ferrier, the Australian-born San Franciscan who won in 1947. That's the first 69 manufactured here in a national tournament since Al Espinosa did it in the final round of the 1927 national open — along with other rounds of 85, 80 and 79.

Ex-Roseburg Convict Jailed On Morals Count

OREGON CITY — Orley Arthur James, 42-year-old ex-convict, was lodged in the Clackamas county jail Tuesday in lieu of \$5000 bail on a charge of sodomy. Deputy Sheriff Joe Shobe said a 16-year-old Redland farm boy made the complaint that brought about James' arrest.

Shobe said James admitted the perversion in part. Investigation is continuing, principally in the Willamette section, to see if James is connected with an alleged wave of sex crime attempts there, Shobe said.

James' record indicates he had made his home at Roseburg. He was sentenced to the Oregon state prison from Roseburg in 1933 for two years on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Alleged Assault Bases Action For Damages

A civil suit charging Deputy Sheriff Ira Byrd with assault and battery was brought to Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly's court this morning.

William D. Mayberry, Roseburg plaintiff, charged in a complaint filed April 9, that Byrd unlawfully assaulted him, striking him about the head and shoulders on Oct. 23, 1950. He alleges that he has been unable to work since that date.

Mayberry asks \$7500 general and \$300 special damages. He is represented by Attorneys Laurence Osterman and Reginald S. Williams, of Salem.

Byrd, in a short answer to Mayberry's complaint, denied all allegations. He is represented by Roseburg attorneys Douglas Walton, Donald S. Kelley and Robert Davis.

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
