

Accidental Death Of F. Harrington Given Hearing

A hearing on the recent accidental death of Floyd Harrington was held June 26, at Canyonville, before Russell B. Jones, a representative of the Industrial Accident Commission. The hearing was called to establish all pertinent facts in connection with the fatal accident. The employer, Carl M. Halverson, Inc., of Portland, is a firm covered through acceptance of the Workmen's Compensation act which is administered by the State Industrial Accident Commission.

Harrington, a flagman, was fatally injured on June 22, 1951, when he was knocked down and run over by a LeTourneau rocker. The accident occurred at the company's road construction project, three miles south of Canyonville.

The hearing elicited testimony of all eye-witnesses or other persons who had knowledge of the accident to determine the situations, actions, or other circumstances which may have contributed to the death. This determination of cause is essential to the prevention of like accidents in the future.

A record of the proceedings will be filed in Salem. Circumstances which caused the accident will be used by the accident prevention division in educational and accident prevention programs.

Russians Abolish Barrier To West Berlin Exports

BERLIN — (AP) — Russian zone authorities approved 600 permits West Berlin exports today indicating the announced settlement of the east-west transport squabble already is taking effect.

The permits were sent back to West Berlin with the transit visas stamped, allowing goods to cross the Soviet zone to West European markets.

In none of the cases did the East one control commission require proof of origin of raw materials used in finished products.

Walking Preacher Wins Damages From Decca

ST. LOUIS — (AP) — The walking preacher of the Ozarks won a \$3,125 judgment here against Capitol Records Distributing company, Inc., on charges that he was defamed by a song.

A federal court jury found for the company on a second count — charging invasion of privacy.

Both sides said they would ask for a new trial.

The walking preacher, Rev. Guy Howard of Branson, Mo., originally sued three companies as joint defendants for \$1,000,000. Two of the defendants, Radio Corporation of America, Inc., and Decca Records corporation, Inc., made out-of-court settlements. The amount of Capitol Records was then reduced to \$320,000.
