Foreign Policy Not Bipartisan, Sen. Taft Claims

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Taft (R-Ohio) declared here it is an "absolute untruth" to say, as President Truman did Monday, that this country has a bipartisan foreign policy.

Taft, who heads the senate Republican policy committee, dismissed without a direct reply Mr. Truman's charges in a speech at Tullahoma, Tenn., Monday that the Republicans are "playing right into the hands of the Russians" by conducting a "smear campaign" against the administration.

But the Ohioan—a possible GOP presidential candidate — disputed Mr. Truman's assertion that "we have had a bipartisan foreign policy in this country since Pearl Harbor" and "I would like to keep it that way."

The President went on to say

that some Republicans—and he obviously was striking at Taft—"want us to play Russian roulette with the foreign policy of the United States—and with all of the chambers of the pistol loaded."

Taft told reporters it is an "absolute untruth" that any bipartisan policy exists now.

"The 1948 election so went to the President's head that he has consulted no Republican leaders since that date," the Ohio senator declared.

Campaign Pattern Seen
If Mr. Truman is going to run for re-election, he laid out a pattern for 1952 campaign speeches in his Tullahoma talk. Any other nominee hardly could escape using the same pattern.

Basically Mr. Truman showed his intention of carrying the fight to the Republicans while defending

his own administration as the champion of world peace.

Voicing his criticism of Taft, and Senator Joe McCarthy without naming them, the President took the same kind of shot at General Douglas MacArthur.

He said some Republicans—obviously referring to MacArthur—want to "take a chance" on (1) spreading the Korean war, (2) tying up all U. S. resources in Asia, (3) "losing our allies in Europe," (4) the belief that Russia won't fight in Asia and (5) that "we won't have a third World war."

Dragline Controls Fail, Damage Parked Vehicle

Bear's Ingratitude Puts Benefactor in Hospital

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — (AP) — Mark Fuller learned the most painful lesson of his 65 years here. Don't be tender-hearted toward a grizzly bear.

The severely injured Alaska road commission employee was in a hospital here with wounds all over his body.

The incident of the misplaced kindness started when Fuller found the bear in a trap, which had been set out after the grizzly

repeatedly raided the road camp messhall. Instead of killing it, Fuller coaxed it into an improvised cage. Then he drove 30 miles from camp and released the animal near Mount McKinley park. The bear promptly attacked him. Doctors said more than 100 stitches were needed to close his wounds.

RED PAPER SEIZED

HAVANA — (AP) — Police have shut down the plant of the Communist newspaper Hoy for the second time. The government seized the paper last year, but a minor court recently ruled the action illegal and ordered the plant returned to Communist leaders.

Wednesday night police—acting on orders from Interior Minister Diaz—shuttered the plant and banned all persons from entering.

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
