A Red Cross senior life saving course will start Monday, July 2, to qualify applicants for the international instructors' course which will be held in Roseburg from July 23 to 29.

Roseburg is very fortunate in being one of the cities in which the instructors' course will be offered, says Lyle Eddy, pool manager. Carl Ross, from the San Francisco Red Cross office, will conduct the instructors' course.

Roseburg officials are very anxious to get quite a number of instructors certified at this time, Eddy said.

Requirements for the instructors' course are that a person must be 18 years old and have taken or had a re-check on his senior life saving within the last year.

The senior life saving course starting Monday is to give all who wish to take the instructors' course a chance to qualify. The course will be open to all who wish to take their senior life saving for the first time, and for senior life savers who wish a re-check before the start of the instructors' course. The life saving class, which Eddy will conduct, will be from 12:15 to 1 p.m. each day.

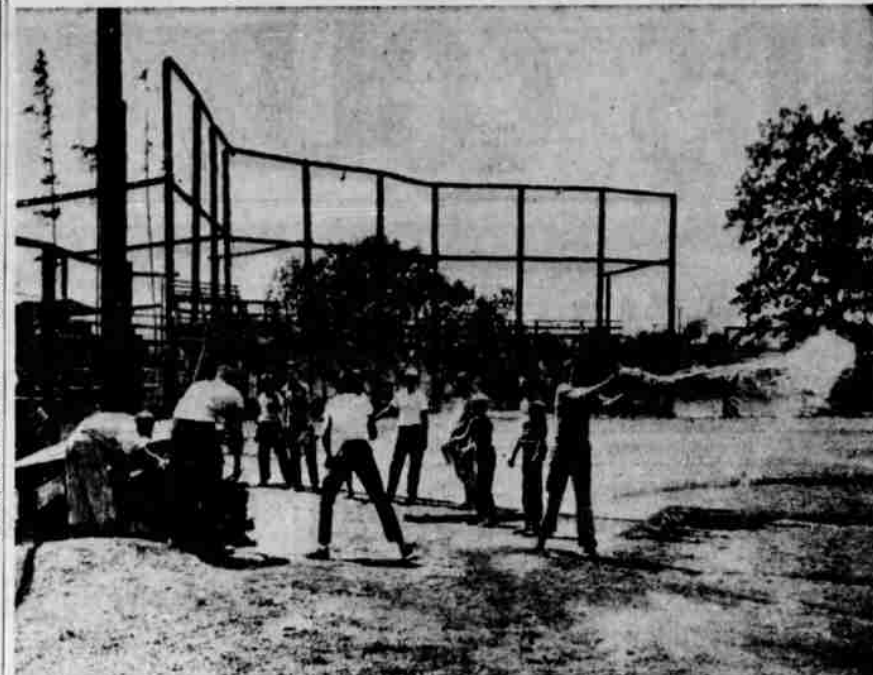

German Soldier Survives 6-Year Burial Alive

WARSAW, Poland — (AP) — The weird story of a German soldier buried alive for six years unfolded here.

Reliable sources said the soldier, identified only as a 32-year old Berliner, is in a hospital being treated for blindness which resulted from entombment since 1945 in a sealed off Wehrmacht underground food warehouse.

Authorities concerned with the case were reluctant to talk, but trustworthy informants gave the following account:

The buried man emerged from his trap near the seaport of Gdynia recently with a knee-length beard and hair hanging down to his ankles. Frightened Poles ran when they saw him. Another German, who had also been buried, fell dead of a heart attack when he came into daylight.

The two, with four comrades, had been trapped in the food bunker when retreating Germans dynamited the entrance to prevent advancing Russians from entering. The six soldiers had sneaked in to pilfer supplies.

There were plentiful supplies of food, wine, tobacco and other stores. A hoard of candles lasted until two years ago. Since then the survivors had lived in total darkness.

Water for drinking seeped through cracks in the reinforced concrete. The men washed in liquor.

Shortly after entombment one of the soldiers committed suicide, another took his own life a few weeks later and two others died of illness. Their bodies were buried in flour which mummified them.

How the two survivors finally escaped was not explained. There were no tools in the bunker.

A whale was entangled once in a submarine cable at a depth of 3,249 feet.

county budget were made as a result of the Friday meeting.

These were an increase to \$500 the amount appropriated for the equalization board and a \$2,500 appropriation for the annual Douglas county turkey shows.

The equalization board, a review board to hear complaints on tax assessments, had been originally budgeted at \$100.

The appropriation for the turkey shows had been left out entirely, the county budget committee feeling there was not enough interest shown in the past. John Davis, Oakland, of the Douglas County Turkey Growers association, appeared before the court to say that there has been considerable interest shown from throughout the nation in the shows and that they give the county much good publicity.

Citizens Collect Gambling Proof

LAKE CHARLES, La. — (AP) — A small army of citizens who concealed their identity roamed speakeasies and night spots for five months and collected evidence for 100 specific charges of gambling.

This underground army, commanded by a citizens crime commission, has laid the charges on the district attorney's desk.

The evidence was gathered despite "threats, both physical and financial," said Attorney James Dewey O'Brien, temporary chairman of a secret five-member commission that directed the operations.

"No one person ever knew the names of more than two other persons working in his area," O'Brien said. "That way we had almost no leaks."

More than 200 citizens from all walks of life took part in ferreting out the dice tables and roulette wheels.

The style of the shadowy operation was suggested by managing editor Kenneth L. Dixon of the Lake Charles American Press. Dixon was an Associated Press war correspondent in France during World War II. He patterned the operation here after the French underground organization.

Co-architect of the plan was a commission member who had escaped from the Germans through the French underground.

The evidence the group presented was against 30 establishments in this city of 50,000 persons.

Dixon fanned public indignation against Lake Charles gambling with editorials. Threats were made against him and on several occasions he was shot at on lonely roads.

Mayberry Says Charges In Report Are Misstated

William D. Mayberry, whose civil suit to collect damages from Deputy Sheriff Ira Byrd was declared in favor of the defendant Thursday, called attention to the fact his complaint had charged only that Byrd had struck him on the shoulder, not the head as stated in the News-Review, and that the deputy had twisted his arm and had dragged him eight feet, causing him "permanent injuries."

Trading Stamps Win OK In State High Court Ruling

SALEM — (AP) — Trading stamps may be given for purchases of fair trade items for which the retail prices are fixed by the manufacturer, the state supreme court ruled.

The decision dismissed a suit in which Lambert Pharmacal Co. of St. Louis, sought to prevent Roberts Brothers, Portland, department store, from giving S & H green stamps for purchases of Lambert products.

The decision reversed Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson, Portland, who had ruled that the stamps can't be given for fair trade items.

The supreme court heard the appeal last January, but afterward, the United States supreme court threw out the fair trade laws of the 45 states that have them.

Wednesday's decision, by Justice Hall S. Lusk, cited the United States supreme court decision as a basis for ruling that you can't stop a retailer from issuing trading stamps on fair trade items.

The decision said that issuing the green trading stamps amounts to a discount of 2.08 percent. The stamps can be turned in for merchandise.

Milk Order Stands

The state supreme court also: Ruled that the state milk administrator, Thomas L. Ohlsen, doesn't have any power to correct an error made in a milk order. The suit was brought by Safeway stores against Ohlsen, who had mistakenly included Columbia county in a Portland marketing area milk order. Safeway contested his right to correct the order.

Ordered Roy Moore, Linn county, sent to prison for life as a habitual criminal.

Ruled that a judge can't add interest charges to a jury's damage verdict. In this case, the State Highway commission sued to condemn the Lincoln county lands of W. K. Deal and others. The jury found the land worth \$7,500, but Judge Fred McHenry added 6 percent interest. The high court, in a decision by Justice Lusk, ordered Judge McHenry to hold a new trial.

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
