R. F. Lytle Attends Summer Training Camp

On graduation from Oregon State college, Cadet Lytle will be eligible for a commission in the army's officers' reserve corps and for consideration for a regular army commission.

Canyonville Man Back Following Korean Duty

Donald W. Lilla, first class engineer, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lilla of Canyonville, arrived in San Diego, Calif., recently aboard the seaplane tender USS Floyd Bay after nine months' duty in the Far East.

The ship completed the cruise from China to San Diego in 23 days.

The Floyd Bay serviced seaplane patrol squadrons just off the coast of Formosa where she established herself as a floating advanced seadrome.

The planes patrolled the China coast and the Formosa straits providing anti-submarine cover for our naval vessels in that area.

The Floyd Bay also conducted search and rescue missions when required.

Wilbur Sailor Returns After Year In Korea

After nearly a year of operating against enemy forces in Korea, James J. Neiss, first class metallurgist, USN, husband of Mrs. Mary F. Neiss of Wilbur, recently returned to the United States aboard the light cruiser USS Manchester.

In supporting UN ground forces in Korea, the cruiser fired the greatest number of rounds of ammunition fired by any Allied warship in the campaign. Following one attack she was credited with more than 6,000 enemy troop casualties.

During its time in the com zone, the Manchester participated in every major UN amphibious operation as well as the naval shore bombardments of more than a dozen coastal cities, several of which were within a few miles of the Siberian border.

U.S. Oil Output Increased As Middle East Supply Cut

NEW YORK — (AP) — Business and industry set up a couple of new production highs last week.

As Middle East oil supplies were cut by developments in Iran, crude oil output in the United States reached a 1951 high of 6,187,930 barrels.

Carloadings hit 82,329, tops for the year to date and an indication that raw materials were moving into the mills and finished goods out of the plants in jig time.

Other Industries Up

The output of other basic industries regained at a high level. Labor trouble were a fly in the ointment, however, in several instances.

East, Gulf and Pacific coast shipping were tied up. United Air Lines pilots walked out and American Airlines pilots threatened to knock off work. Atomic energy workers at Oak Ridge, Tenn., were out for three days.

Defense orders were the stimulus behind the continuing high level of industrial production.

Some consumer goods, however, were a drag on the market. Consumer resistance to prices pulled down the dollar volume of retail sales.

Economic Stabilization Director

Eric Johnston said demands of defense production would tear "gaping holes in the supply of civilian goods" in the next few months.

He added that the cost-of-living index is "rising by the month" and every percentage point increase costs the consumers two billion dollars a year.

Inflation, he said, has cheated the nation out of \$7,000,000,000 worth of armaments. "Lost as surely as if they had been sunk by a hostile submarine."

Furniture Cutbacks Seen

The Federal Reserve board said department store sales throughout the country were only one percent

troit, predicted higher prices for refrigerators and ranges.

G. C. Denebink, sales vice president of Bigelow-Sanford Carpet Co., forecast a "sharp upturn" in sales after "a hangover from the biggest buying binge in history."

Many economists saw busy days ahead after a brief lull in some industries. More industries and additional firms were planning large expansion programs.

Record-Setting Expansion

The Commerce department and the Securities and Exchange commission reported a survey indicated record-setting expansion by American industry for the final quarter.

The department said the survey indicated that expansion spending would be above the original schedule, which called for an unprecedented \$23,900,000,000 on new plants and equipment in 1951.

Bigger tax bites were ahead. The House approved \$7,200,000,000 tax increase, the largest in American history. The Senate looks it over this week.

Rep. Dougherty (D-NC), head of the ways and means committee which drew up the bill, said it was urgently needed to finance the defense program.

Electric Current Will Catch Fish

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Electric currents some day may replace nets as a means of catching fish, a group of scientists reports.

The idea is based on a discovery made several years ago by German scientists. They found that fish were attracted to the positive terminal of a gap in an electric circuit.

This lead has been developed to the point where electrical systems now can be used to sweep small areas of shallow water free of fish, the experimenters told the American association for the advancement of science.

The reports were made by Dr. Carl L. Hubbs, Dr. Andreas B. Reznitzner and Dr. John D. Isaacs of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography, La Jolla, Calif.

Experiments are under way also at the University of Michigan under Dr. Karl L. Jager and at the California Academy of Sciences under Dr. Robert C. Miller to determine how effective the method may be under commercial fishing conditions.
