acres of timber in the Crocke National forest were reported lost. CALIFORNIA: Near Alturas in the northeast, flames already destroyed 1,500 acres as more than 400 loggers, forest service men and prisoners were pressed into service in the Modoc National forest. Northwest Situation Bad

WASHINGTON AND OREGON: Fire situation still acute. A 1,900-acre blaze in the Willamette National forest near Eugene, Ore., was fought by 900 men. In northwestern Washington, a 450-acre area was under fire eight miles east of Arlington and state extended the western Washington logging shutdown through July 4 except in two counties.

The Pacific Northwest's biggest fire in British Columbia where an uncontrolled blaze raged over 20,000 acres on Vancouver Island. Foresters said only rain could stop the fire, but there was no rain in sight.

Rivers On Rampage

The Arkansas river in Kansas washed away dikes despite efforts of volunteer workers. A 90-foot breakthrough north of Maize, Kas., sent ruinous water over thousands of acres of ripe wheat. Missouri towns below Jefferson City in the Missouri river area were still troubled and 40,000 acres are endangered at St. Charles, Mo., where the river is expected to crest at 35.4 feet. The Missouri topped one levee and broke through another near St. Charles flooding some 6,000 acres and forcing some 200 farm families from their homes.

that Cochrane said he was reaching for a cigarette and lost control of the car.

Warren and Cochrane were believed to have been thrown out of the machine as it rolled down the bank. The car evidently struck and crushed Warren, who died about an hour after the accident. Livingston also was crushed, but his body was still in the car and was removed about 30 minutes later. Cochrane, despite injuries, was able to crawl back to the road and halt a passing car. he was taken by Copco ambulance to the hospital at Medford.

His condition was not believed to be critical. The two bodies were brought to the Roseburg Funeral home and were prepared for removal to their respective home towns.

Warren's body was taken to Hull & Hull Funeral home in Grants Pass. His survivors include his widow, Dora, and a son, both residing at Grants Pass.

Livingston's body was removed to Portland. His survivors include his widow, Christina; his mother, Mrs. Della Livingston, Kansas City, Kan.; two sisters and three stepchildren.

Livingston was born Feb. 19, 1885 in Louisville, Kas., and had lived in Oregon since 1936. He was an employee of Copco at the time of his death, and was a veteran of World War I and a member of the American Legion.

Surviving are his widow, Christina, Portland; his mother, Mrs. Della Livingston, Kansas City, Kas.; two sisters, Mrs. Ruby Bowling and Mrs. Nona Heretich, both of Kansas City. Funeral services will be held in Portland. The Roseburg Funeral home was in charge of the local arrangements.

Warren was born in Alma, Ark., and was a resident of Grants Pass.

Surviving are his widow, Dora, Grants Pass; five sons: Louis, Carroll, M. D., and Burk, all of Grants Pass, and Eugene of Gateway, Ore.; a daughter, Mrs. Pearl Cook, Santa Paula, Calif.; two brothers, three sisters and nine grandchildren.

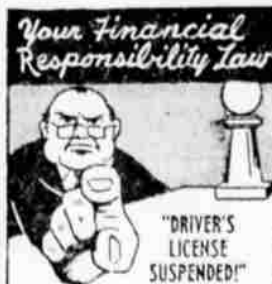

Negro Kills 2, Wounds 5 Over Juke Box Dispute

BRANCHVILLE, S. C. — (AP) — A 22-year-old Negro killed two men and wounded five other persons with shotgun blasts fired in a rage when a juke box failed to play the record he had selected. Sheriff George L. Reed said Carroll Gantt was held in connection with the shooting.

Reed said the blasts killed Police Chief J. W. Etheridge and a Negro bystander, Robert Barnes. Among the five Negroes who were wounded was a five-year-old boy. The shooting occurred in a Negro cafe in this small community.

BEND — (AP) — Fire leveled a \$175,000 manufacturing plant and did an estimated \$10,000 damage to another before being controlled here Saturday.

San Quentin Convicts Flee In 2 Break Efforts

SAN QUENTIN, Calif. — (AP) — Convicts tried two weekend escapes from San Quentin prison. Both failed—for lack of planning, said Warden Clinton Duffy.

Three got over the wall Saturday. They surrendered seven hours later two miles away. They had no money, guns, tools—and apparently no outside contacts, and didn't know what to do, Duffy said.

Two others tried Sunday. They sawed a bar from a roof ventilator—then dropped it. It clanged down five stories.

Guard L. W. Adams watched it fall. Then he caught Robert Steven Erhardt, 22, and Edward Yurko, 24—both sent up from San Diego and wanted in other states.

barrage. Another 30 to 40 Reds were killed or wounded.

Although the fighting was bitter in spots, there still seemed to be some reluctance on both sides to push too hard or too fast.

There is no way of knowing how long such a situation might continue.

Chinese Nationalists on Formosa predict cease-fire talks will be drawn out over a long period. They said the Reds asked that the talks be scheduled July 10 to 15 to give them an opportunity to consult with Moscow.

In Hong Kong, a gateway to Red China, many observers expressed the opinion the Reds have tentatively agreed to future peace in Korea for a reason. They say the next step will be a Russian demand for greater voice in the proposed Japanese peace treaty.
