place," said Maj. Edgar Beam of Vale, N. C., the flight leader. Carrier planes strafed, rocketed and bombed Chinnampo, port of Pyongyang.

On the battlefield more than 20 miles north of the 38th parallel, Allied tanks blasted at stubbornly defending Reds trying to shove off U. N. forces approaching Pyongyang, the northern apex of the old Communist "Iron Triangle." (Pyongyang should not be confused with P'yongyang.)

Warnings Issued
Chinese and Americans alike were warned they would have to look to their national defenses despite cease-fire talks.

China's Peiping radio warned that China's own defenses would have to be strengthened once an armistice is effected.

In Washington U. S. Secretary of Defense Marshall said this is no time to let down America's guard.

Marshall said plans are to keep U. S. troops in Korea until "things are settled." And Moscow reported the Chinese probably will keep their troops in Korea as long as the American stay.

President Syngman Rhee said South Korea could not accept an armistice at the 38th parallel, old dividing line of North and South Korea.

Rhee said that would be appeasement. "It will bring us closer to World War three."

Canada Counts 74 Dead
In Three-Day Holiday

TORONTO — (AP) — The death toll from Canada's long Dominion day weekend rose Monday night to 74, the worst for a three-day holiday since World War Two.

Fatalities from the celebration of Dominion day — July 1 anniversary of Canada's becoming a dominion — included 30 drowned, 24 killed in automobile accidents and 20 dead in other accidents and fires from Friday night to Monday night.

tance of a bid of Howard Cooper Corp. for \$7850 for purchase of a street sweeper. The price includes trading in the present sweeper.

A petition was presented asking that a survey be made to determine the cost of reopening and grading Terrace Ave. through lot 6 in block 11 and opening up and grading of Brush street across lot 10, block 12, and lots 7, 8, 9 and 10, block 11, and also the cost of installing sewers.

Another petition asked for grading and oiling portions of Glen and Reservoir streets, the work to be done by the city and the oil to be paid for by the property owners. Both petitions were referred to the city manager and street committee for study and report.

Parking Strip Job Deferred
Improvement of the parking strip in the last block on North Jackson will have to wait, at least until next year's budget is prepared. An estimate of \$3,905 was submitted by City Engineer Arthur Boyer for putting concrete curbing around the block-long strip and paving six feet on the west side to connect with existing paving along that side. The cost did not include leveling the parking strip, which could be done with city equipment nor the cost of hauling in top soil and laying of a sprinkling system. Since no money has been budgeted for the work, the council decided to postpone the matter for another year, when the project cost could be put in the budget.

Plans for an administration building at the airport were considered. Councilman Harrison Winston, chairman of the airport committee, was delegated by Mayor Albert G. Fiegl to bring in a report on the type of building desired and recommendations for construction at the earliest possible date. Approximately \$30,000 is available for the building.

Annexation of a certain area in Beulah's addition, as requested in a consent petition at the last meeting, was considered. But since the annexation would exclude a connecting strip, it was decided to try to get the other property owners interested also.

Registrations to date have been coming in slow. An estimated 1200 pickers will be needed to harvest the approximate 106 acres of beans this summer.

Women and children, especially, are urged to heed the call and register at the local employment office so that there will be an assurance of adequate pickers, said Foster.

Another American — businessman Robert A. Vogeler, who also confessed to spy charges in a Hungarian court — was released five days before Oatis' arrest, after serving 17 months of his 15-year sentence.

Vogeler, recuperating from his ordeal at Grand Lake, Colo., declared Oatis' "confession" was forced.

"Their trial by terror has no justice," he said.

Vogeler has branded his own confession as "rubbish." He declared it was wrong from him by long hours of questioning without food or rest, and by slugging, ice water baths and stimulants.)
