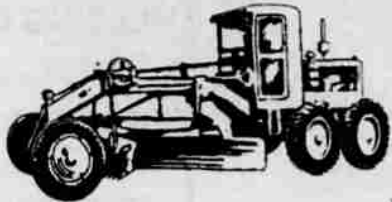
The Umpqua Rebekah lodge will meet Tuesday evening for the installation of new officers. All members are especially urged to attend this meeting.

### Sales Tax Pours Riches Into California Treasury

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — (AP) — Boom time spending is pouring money via the state's three percent sales tax into the state treasury at the rate of more than \$1,000,000 a day.

State Controller Thomas H. Kuchel reported that for the first 11 months of the 1950-51 bookkeeping year, ending June 30, sales tax revenue amounted to \$390,380,090. That's already \$16,000,000 more than administration budget makers figured last January for the full 12 months.

## Draft Problem Seen In Peace

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — (AP) — A cease-fire in Korea, although welcome to all concerned, would complicate the job of Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, the nation's director of selective service, he said here. Hershey spoke to Kentucky draft officials and told them he wants local draft boards to have the final say in deferring college students. Local board members must use their own judgment, he declared. Remarking about a possible cease-fire in Korea, he said if that happens, "everyone will yell 'why draft me now?'"

Pressure of those already in service to get out will be great, he added. Hershey said, however, he is reconciled to the problem, having gone through a similar one at the end of World War II.

## Meaning Of Peace Terms Explained

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's proposal for an "armistice" in Korea has posed the question: What is the difference between an armistice, a cease-fire and a truce?

Generally speaking here is what the terms have meant in past wars: Cease-fire—a halt in the actual shooting.

Armistice—a cease-fire plus certain specific terms, such as provision for the opposing armies to fall back a set distance. It may also provide for a definite or indefinite period of no fighting. Truce—a suspension of fighting by agreement of opposing commanders, especially one of considerable duration.

Some American officials say that in reference to Korea they use the terms cease-fire and armistice to mean about the same thing.

### Returned Vet Killed In Hotel Stairwell

SEATTLE — (AP) — A purple heart Korea war veteran, just returned from frontline duty, fell six stories to his death in a hotel stairwell Sunday night.

Police said the soldier, Corp. Gordon Pahmeier, 23, Madison, Wis., tried to hop across the stair-

well from the eighth floor to the seventh floor while trying to catch up with two buddies.

Two army buddies told investigators the soldier lost his grip and fell to the second-floor landing.

His soldier companions, Charles Dietrich and Kirby Kyle, told police the trio had had "a few drinks" in their 10th floor room and were leaving the hotel.

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## How many "Independence Days" have we left?

"We hold these truths to be self-evident; that all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.

" . . . That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men . . ." Here is the reason for and the purpose of government. Government is but a servant — not a master — not a giver of anything.

" . . . deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed . . ." In America, the government may assume only the powers you allow it to have. It may assume no others.

From Concord to Korea, your kinsmen have fought and died for the principles of America's Declaration of Independence: belief in God . . . belief in the God-given rights of man . . . belief that man is more important than government . . . belief in the vital need for morality in all man does.

But on this Independence Day, as never before, these beliefs are in deadly peril. There are people in America who would deny your God-given rights, who prefer expediency to morality, and who would make government the master — not the servant — of man. These people are the advocates of an all-powerful, all-providing socialistic government to control your destiny from cradle to grave.

The time has come to answer them with your own "Declaration of Independence" . . .

Declare that government is responsible TO you—rather than FOR you.

Declare that freedom is more important to you than "security" or "survival"

Declare again that the rights God gave you may not be taken away by any government on any pretext.

Our founding fathers accepted the truths of America's Declaration on faith alone. Today, our nation is proof — absolute and irrevocable — that these truths work. They are the last great hope for the protection of human civilization.

### FREEDOM NEEDS YOU

On this 175th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, help give the day the spiritual, religious meaning it had to the founding fathers.

Renew your faith and allegiance to the immortal truths stated in the Declaration. Make them an active part of your thinking, your acting, your voting.

Pray for help in maintaining man's closeness to God, in preserving man's God-given rights and responsibilities against those who would make you dependent upon a socialistic, all-powerful government.
