Hungary's Demand Rejected By U.S.

BUDAPEST, Hungary.—(AP)—The United States has rejected a Hungarian demand for the recall of three members of its Budapest legation charged with plotting against the Communist government here.

Hungary demanded the withdrawal of the trio on July 2, accusing them of "actively cooperating in the spying activities" of defendants in the recent trial at which Archbishop Jozsef Groesz and eight others were convicted of an anti-government plot.

A legation spokesman announced the U. S. State department refused to accept the "premise that legation staff members were allegedly implicated in the Groesz case."

The United States on Tuesday complied with Hungary's other demand based on the Groesz case. The legation closed down the U. S. information service library and movie theater, and in addition voluntarily stopped publication of its daily news bulletin in English and Hungarian.

Fight On Hospital Grounds Leads To Four Arrests

Veterans hospital Officer George Loomis, about 50, attempted to break up a brawl between four men last night on the hospital grounds but received a beating himself until a state police officer arrived and arrested the four, state police report.

A city patrolman assisted in breaking up the battle. Loomis was bruised somewhat while two other hospital personnel—Dr. Burhl Gilpin and engineer Harold King—who went to his aid, received minor scratches.

Lodged in the county jail were David William Lakey, 21, Drain; and three Sutherland men: Lynn Ellis Cooper, 20; Victor Frank Maiello, 25; and Lawrence Edward Ford, 20.

Cooper and Maiello were booked on charges of assault and battery, while Cooper also drew a charge of possession of an intoxicating beverage. Lakey was charged with disorderly conduct and Ford was charged with being drunk in a public place and possessing intoxicating liquor, according to state police.

Police said several juveniles were also involved but were not lodged in jail.

The U. S. Fifth air force sent only 210 sorties against the Reds in daylight Thursday. Only 29 of these hit near battle lines. One Mustang fighter was shot down by Red anti-aircraft.

Oregon's Fourth Of July Quiet And Low-Abiding

Only one fatality was reported in the period between 6 p. m. Tuesday and midnight of the Fourth. That was a Dutch sailor who fell to his death while attempting to jump from a ship to a Portland pier.

Oregon's new law banning fireworks, except sparklers and cap pistols, contributed much to the quiet of the day. A few fireworks displays were put on by community and civic organizations, but these were closely supervised.

Break In Water Main Receives Quick Repairs

Water service in the Winchester area was interrupted for a few hours Tuesday while a fast-working Oregon Water corporation crew repaired a broken leak band in near record time.

The break was in the 20-inch water main behind the Del Rey cafe on highway 99 north. Only the houses between the plant on the river and one half mile south of Winchester were affected.

Farmers noticed water Tuesday morning in a creek ordinarily dry, leading to discovery of the break. Workmen shut off water on both sides to eliminate pressure, dug out the main, and made repairs in slightly more than three hours.

Alton Andrews, Oregon Water corporation's Roseburg manager, said chemicals in the soil had eaten through the old leak band.

Announcements over the radio during the day were designed to help conserve water in order to maintain the reservoirs' levels in case of emergency. The public was very cooperative, Andrews said, and water levels remained fairly constant.

DRUNK DRIVER RAPPED

Chester W. Kiser, 29, a Camas Valley millworker, was sentenced to 15 days in the county jail and fined \$250 in district court Tuesday, reports Judge A. J. Geddes. Kiser was arrested by a deputy sheriff and charged with drunk driving.

United Press services and against the free press of the world.

In New York The Associated Press branded the trial as "a sham and a mockery of elemental justice." The AP said legitimate newsgathering had been "twisted and distorted" into espionage, and "the Associated Press will continue, by all means available, to seek Oatis' release from this cruel and unjust detention."

Oatis, 37-year-old Marion, Ind., newsman, has been employed by the Associated Press since 1937. He spent four years of this period, during World War II, in the U. S. army.

He was arrested by secret police on April 23. Since then no representative of the Associated Press or the United States government has been able to talk with him.

The embassy never was able to get a copy of the indictment. All other western correspondents have left Czechoslovakia or been expelled.

Proposed Consolidation Of Schools Is Defeated

The proposed consolidation of Scotts Valley, district 30; Pleasant Valley, district 79, and Yencalla, district 32, was defeated at an election held June 28. At Yencalla, 39 votes were cast, 25 for and 14 against. At Scotts Valley, 35 ballots were counted, two for consolidation, and 33 against. At Pleasant Valley the entire ballot was against consolidation.

Mock A-Bomb Attack Builds Horror Picture

BALTIMORE.—(AP)—The horror of an atomic attack came to life Wednesday night for some 30,000 Baltimore citizens who turned out for an old fashioned fireworks display at the municipal stadium.

Actually it was a mock attack staged by city and state civil defense agencies to drive home the danger in case an atom bomb were dropped in this busy defense area.

But the simulated drill, aired over all the state's radio stations, sent worried citizens rushing to their telephones to ask the phone company, police and newspaper offices what it was all about.

At Hagerstown, 50 miles away, one woman broke up a church service.

"Baltimore is being bombed!" she yelled a warning at the worshippers. "The planes are on their way to Hagerstown now."

Back in Memorial stadium, the scene of the simulated attack, children were playing tag and hopscotch. The parents were mowing lawns or putting in the garden when a roar of planes came in on a loud speaker.

Red alert! A siren wailed, anti-aircraft artillery from Fort Meade blasted at a supposed enemy, but one aircraft got through with an "atom bomb"—a giant firecracker with a bright flash.

Rescue workers streamed in, carried out bodies, doused fires and plugged broken water mains.
