Court OK Asked On Agreement On Davidson Will

Approval of an agreement entered into by beneficiaries of the will of the late Alfred E. Davidson is sought in a complaint filed in circuit court Monday.

Davidson, whose estate has been appraised at more than \$100,000, died Feb. 18, 1949. He left his widow, Anna Pearl Davidson, \$100 monthly support money. Much of the remainder of the estate was to go to various religious institutions in Douglas county.

Mrs. Davidson filed a petition Aug. 30, 1949, asking that the will be set aside, asserting Davidson was of unsound mind at the time the document was drawn.

The complaint filed Monday in circuit court further claims the will is ambiguous and improperly drawn. Davidson's interest in Sunday schools and Bible education was expressed through his will. One section leaves those assets remain-

ing ten years after his death to be divided among Sunday schools in Douglas county, "to further advance the training and Bible education of our youth in whose future I am greatly concerned."

Beneficiaries of the will, excepting Sunday schools which are not legal entities, have since entered into a tentative agreement to provide for a definite method of distribution of beneficial monies to religious and charitable institutions.

The circuit court is asked in the suit to ratify the agreement.
