### Basketball Stars Plead Guilty To Fixing Charges

NEW YORK — (AP) — All 14 former college basketball stars accused of rigging games at Madison Square Garden pleaded guilty today to conspiracy charges.

Judge Saul S. Streit fixed Oct. 2 for sentencing the athletes whose change of plea enabled them to escape prosecution on more serious bribery charges pending against them. Their bail was continued.

The 14 were accused of conspiring with four alleged fixers to rig the scores of games so the fixers could cash in on "sure thing" point bets.
