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countries, including the United States. The others named are Australia, Burma, Canada, Ceylon, France, India, Indonesia, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Pakistan, the Philippines, United Kingdom, and Soviet Russia.

Thus Russia would be deprived of a veto which Moscow has been demanding in vainly urging a Pacific treaty drafted by the big powers alone. It is considered doubtful also that India will sign, but the others are expected to go along. More than a score of other countries which broke relations with Japan will also be invited to sign.

Officials look for American ratification to be delayed probably until early next year, after extensive senate hearings. Should there be a delay of more than nine months in putting the treaty into effect, there is a provision that individual nations could bring it into effect for themselves and Japan.

Copco Arranges Loan; N. Umpqua Progress Told

MEDFORD — Under terms of a recent bank credit agreement, California-Oregon power company will borrow \$12,000,000 by December 31, 1951, President A. S. Cummins has reported.

Quoted in the Wall Street Journal, Cummins stated that Copco expects to make its first borrowing in September, 1951. The loans are payable June 30, 1953.

Cummins said that the 18,000-kilowatt Slide creek plant on the North Umpqua river will be ready for service this month. Soda Springs and Fish creek plants, with a total of 22,000 kilowatts are to be finished October 1 and December 1, respectively.

Permission has been granted for construction of Clearwater plants Nos. 1 and 2 with combined 41,000-kilowatt capacity. Completion is set for late in 1952 and early in 1953.

Copco has applied to the federal power commission and the Oregon hydroelectric commission for licenses to build a 50,000-kilowatt plant on the Klamath river. Known as Big Bend No. 2 it would be the first in a series of plants on the river to produce a minimum of 200,000 kilowatts for the Klamath Falls load center and for north and south transmission.

Instructors will be Eddie Wyatt, Bob Feldkamp, Mrs. Evelyn Thorp, Mrs. Margaret McCabe, Mr. & Mrs. Charles Fox and Donaldson. Classes are open to those over eight years of age. The swimmers are divided into minnow, fish, flying fish and shark classifications.

Reversed Decision Frees C. E. Miller Of Charges

The state supreme court decision Friday reversing points of law decided upon by Douglas court Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly frees C. E. Miller of a charge of obtaining property under false pretenses, District Attorney Robert Davis said Monday.

Davis said the supreme court had decided Miller's act, an oral guarantee of an obligation to a third party, did not come under the legal definition of either property or money. Thus, he added, Miller could not legally be considered guilty of that charge.

Miller had been sentenced on Nov. 17, 1950 to serve two years in the state penitentiary by Judge Wimberly. Miller's attorney immediately filed the appeal to the supreme court and Miller was released on bail.

Davis did not say whether any other charges would be filed against Miller.

ment to correspondents. It was written in pencil.

"Honorable" was heavily underlined.

After landing on his return to Seoul from the opening session, Admiral Joy said to waiting newsmen:

"No comment, boys."

None of the five delegates revealed how discussions went by the expressions on their faces. It was impossible to tell whether things had gone well or badly.

All the men in the service party had been cautioned not to discuss their trip with the press. They carried out their orders perfectly.

Observers in Seoul said they thought the two main points to be discussed would be establishment of just what positions the opposing armies should hold during the cease-fire and creation of a neutral commission to survey activities behind the lines.

Both points are ticklish. There has been much speculation that the Reds would take advantage of the cease-fire talks to prepare for new attacks.

The conference could break down on either of these issues.

If the talks should fail, Allied observers predict the Red armies would strike swiftly in a new attempt to destroy the U. N. forces. All previous such attempts have failed. U. N. ground forces are now stronger than ever.

Memorial Honors Fliers In Berlin Airlift Task

BERLIN — (AP) — Berliners, 75,000 strong jammed Tempelhof air base today as the city government unveiled a memorial to the Allied airlift which snapped the Soviet blockade two years ago.

The vast throng stood in mute tribute to what Mayor Ernst Reuter described as the "spirit that kept Berlin free."

The monument is a 63-foot stone arch with three crescent-like tips symbolizing the American, British and French "air corridors" used by the big cargo planes to span the Russian zone and free the city. Inscribed in bronze at the base of the statue were the names of 70 Allied fliers and five Germans who died mostly in crashes during the 11-month-long siege.

Under this arrangement, the federal government will supply one-half of payments up to \$50, she said. Thirty-three persons in the county home have been declared eligible for the federal help.
