Kiwanis--Lions Apple Box Derby Will Be Staged

Two Lions club members invaded the lair of the Roseburg Kiwanis club Tuesday noon and challenged the club to an apple-box derby contest.

Al McBee, wearing an official derby helmet and riding a power lawn mower, entered pulling a wheel chair carrying Jerry Gilbo. McBee issued the challenge to meet the Kiwanians in a sort of pre-derby event to be run off Saturday morning on Winchester street, in advance of the Apple Box derby, which the Junior chamber of commerce and Hansen Motors are sponsoring.

The only requirement, said McBee, is that the combined weight of the vehicle and the rider, selected from a member of the club, be not less than 200 pounds. Also, the vehicle to be used must have no motivating power, except that created by gravity.

Kiwanis President J. E. Slattery, in accepting the Lions' challenge, appointed Fred Lockwood, Roy Catching, Paul Barcus and Herb Weisberger as a committee to make the necessary arrangements for a derby entry and a rider.

The Kiwanis program included a talk by J. A. Harding, owner of the Hotel Umpqua, which is observing its 25th anniversary. Harding spoke on changes he has noted in the growth of the city during that time. He said there had been some very lean years, but that the hotel has been able to weather that period and to make improvements to keep pace with the growth of the city. He said that plans were ready, but have to be held up because of building restrictions, to enlarge the coffee shop, rearrange and install new equipment in the kitchen and to enlarge the banquet room to handle larger functions.

Prize for Hawaiians
Speaking briefly on his recent trip to Honolulu, Harding said, "Those who haven't been there have a treat coming. You should start planning now, even if it may be 10 years before you can make the trip."

He said it is interesting to see how many nationalities can get along, working together, without conflict. He commented that the rest of the world could do well to get along together like the people of Hawaii.

In response to information requested by Col. M. Crawford, civil defense director for Roseburg, Harry Hill reported that his committee on raising volunteers for the civil police force is making definite progress, but the quota of 25 names requested has not been reached. He emphasized that each member of the club should, if possible, have a representative from his business on the police reserves.

Present, Future School Problems Topics Of Talks

Paul Elliott, superintendent of city schools, and O. J. Monger, superintendent of Canyonville schools, went to University high school in Eugene Tuesday to attend a conference of school administrators.

They heard Dr. Worth McClure, executive secretary of the American Association of School Administrators, and Dr. Paul Rehms, superintendent of Portland schools, speak on school problems.

Dr. McClure spoke on "Modern Demands on the School Administrator," placing emphasis on keeping the public informed as to what the schools are doing and how they were doing it. Democratic principles should be used in the organization of school teachers and principals, he said.

Dr. Rehms discussed "Financing Schools in Oregon." He reviewed the methods of finance now used and pointed out that approximately \$75 million was spent on enrollment of about 250,000. Dr. Rehms said all records indicate that by 1960 the number of children enrolled will be twice that of 1950, and the matter of financing this increase needs a lot of study.

Beck Cleared Of Robbing Reedsport Woman

SALEM — (AP) — Frederick Beck, who was fired as state prison school supervisor, is clear of all larceny and smuggling charges.

A circuit court jury acquitted him of a larceny charge brought by Mrs. William Berry, Reedsport, who had accused Beck of stealing \$3,500 from her. She claimed this money had been sent to Salem to win freedom for her convict husband, and that Beck had taken it.

Several weeks ago, District Judge Joseph Felton dismissed charges that Beck had smuggled benedrine inside the prison walls.

Traffic Ban Planned For Apple Box Derby

Traffic will be blocked off Saturday morning from Beacon street to E. 2nd Ave. S. so that the Apple box derby event can be staged on Winchester street without interference, announces Police Chief Lloyd J. Larsen.

Persons living on Winchester street are requested to help make the derby a success by parking their automobiles on side streets for a few hours to clear Winchester street for the race, Chief Larsen said.

People in the vicinity of the Todd apartments, 1st, 2nd and 3rd avenues north, are urged to use N. Jackson street that morning rather than Winchester. Chief Larsen said he would appreciate the cooperation of motorists in these respects to insure the safety of youths participating in the race.
