Roseburg Soldier Gets Purple Heart

WITH THE 1st CAVALRY DIVISION, US ARMY, IN KOREA (Delayed) — A Roseburg army man has been awarded the Purple Heart medal in Korea.

The decoration was conferred on Private First Class Gerald E. Heilman, son of Mrs. Fannie Heilman, Roseburg, for wounds received in action near Yongchun on May 31.

Heilman is in the 1st cavalry division's 5th regiment, the colorful infantry force that made history with the October capture of North Korea's capital city, Pyongyang.

It also was the unit that smashed the Chinese encirclement of 2,500 French and American GIs at Chipyongni in February, ending one of the boldest enemy attempts to slice deeply into UN forces on the central front.

Mrs. Mary Emma Wood Dies At Hospital Here

Mrs. Mary Emma Wood, 79, resident of Roseburg for the last ten years, died at a local hospital Wednesday following a prolonged illness. She was born at Boca, Calif., Aug. 26, 1871, and was married to James Arwin Wood, who preceded her in death on Nov. 16, 1940. She had made her home at Orange, Calif., before coming to Roseburg in December 1940. She and her late husband celebrated their golden wedding anniversary in 1939.

Mrs. Wood was a member of the Presbyterian church at Orange, Calif., the Roseburg Rebekah lodge and the Past Noble Grand club of Roseburg.

Surviving is a daughter, Mrs. Lester L. (Helene) Wimberly, Roseburg. Her body has been removed to the Long & Orr mortuary and will be forwarded tonight to Orange, Calif., for services and interment in Fairhaven cemetery beside the grave of her late husband. City Of Sutherlin Sued By Roseburg Contractor

A suit to recover \$7,842.62 allegedly unpaid for work done was filed Wednesday in circuit court against the city of Sutherlin. Jack Isaacson, Roseburg contractor, filed the suit through his attorneys, Winston and Dimick. The complaint alleges that the city of Sutherlin owed Isaacson \$12,721.40 for the completion of a water treatment plant in Sutherlin. Thus far, Isaacson's complaint alleges, Sutherlin has paid \$4878.78 of the total amount. The work was completed March 17, 1949, the complaint states. Harrison R. Winston, one of the attorneys, said the work was taken over by Isaacson August 10, 1948, after another contractor had failed to complete the project.

Land Battles Fought

Attacking United Nations forces ran into stubborn Red resistance on the east-central fighting front today.

An Eighth army communiqué said Allied troops attacked southeast of Kumsong against light resistance but soon became "heavily engaged" with an undetermined number of Reds. The Communists used semi-automatic and automatic weapons and mortar fire. Kumsong is about ten miles east of the Red's old "Iron Triangle" staging area.

The action was continuing in late afternoon.

To the east, Allies threw back two light Red probing attacks.

Funeral services will be held Saturday, July 14, in Drain Baptist church. The Rev. Mr. DuBose will officiate. Interment will follow in Drain cemetery. Stearns mortuary, Oakland, is in charge of arrangements.

Grange Renews Battle Against Daylight Saving

SALEM — (AP) — The State range and Farmers union have asked the state supreme court again to put Oregon back on standard time.

The two farm organizations appealed from a decision by Circuit Judge George R. Duncan, Salem, who had dismissed their case.

They argue that Governor Douglas McKay had no authority to put Oregon on daylight time last April 23. They said he doesn't have this authority unless all neighboring states have the fast time, too.

Both organizations are sponsoring an initiative measure to keep the state on standard time.

In a similar suit filed in April, the supreme court refused to hear the case.

Labor Shortages Being Felt, Department Says

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Labor department says that labor shortages are "more widespread and troublesome than at any previous time since Korea."

Robert C. Goodwin, head of the department's bureau of employment security, said that while no overall labor shortage has developed so far, the employment situation seems to be tightening, especially for skilled and semi-skilled workers.

At the same time, Goodwin said, workers in some areas are beginning to lose their jobs because the predominant industries — autos, for example — are running short of strategic materials going instead into defense.

Train-Auto Crash Kills Mother; 3 Children Hurt

SALEM — (AP) — A Salem mother was killed and her three children seriously injured Wednesday night when a speeding Southern Pacific streamliner struck an automobile at the Nebraska street crossing in Salem.

The dead woman is Mrs. Christine Williamson, 34. The children, aged 2, 4 and 9, are in a Salem hospital with severe head injuries, and broken arms and legs.

A fourth child was stillborn after the mother's death.

Truman Asks Pay Raise For Federal Employees

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman asked Congress today to vote a seven percent "across the board" pay increase for the government's postal and civil service workers.

President Truman also asked legislation which in effect would do away with the two lowest pay grades for substitute postal workers, permitting them to be hired at grade three instead of at grade one as at present.
