NEW YORK — (AP) — More companies each year are sending workers' children through college. Not all workers — just those with the smartest kids.

If your junior has plenty between the ears, and if innocent bystanders agree with you in your opinion that junior is unusually bright, here's how some companies make it possible for you to send the boy to college, with the company footing all or part of the bills.

Company-sponsored scholarship programs for employees and their children are expanding all the time, the National Industrial Conference board reports.
