

**Bill Provides Damage Payments in Enemy Blows**

WASHINGTON (AP)—A multi-billion-dollar bill vesting vast powers in the President to make income and property damage payments laid before Congress.

Elmer B. Staats, assistant director of the budget bureau, outlined the war damage measure at a hearing of the senate banking subcommittee. It would give the President the right to pay up to \$22,000,000,000 for income and property damages in case of enemy attack.

A war damage corporation would be created to handle war loss claims. Staats testified the measure was stand-by in character and designed only for "an extreme emergency."

The first assumption of government agencies that assisted in drafting it, he said, is that a successful enemy attack "is capable of visit gnui pnotkacetaon shrldu of visiting upon us destruction and devastation such as we have never known before."

"The explosive force of one A-bomb is as great as the total explosive force of all the bombs and rockets which fell on Britain during the six terrible years of World War II," he testified.

**Jury Frees White Man Of Assaulting Negro**

VICKSBURG, Miss. (AP)—A jury of 12 white men Thursday acquitted a 27-year-old white farmer charged with raping a 31-year-old unmarried Negro woman.

The state demanded death for Lonnie Bevell, who was charged with raping Corneliouss Slater at a deer-hunting camp near here last New Year's eve.

Mississippi officials said it was the first time in their memory that a white man's life was asked for raping a Negro woman.

Bevell, a veteran of both the army and navy from Batesville, Miss., maintained his innocence when he took the stand in his own defense.

**Rotarians Show Film On Japan's YMCA Progress**

Progress of the Young Men's Christian association's world service program in Japan—one of 26 nations where it is being carried out—was shown in a movie projected for Roseburg Rotarians Thursday noon at the Hotel Umpqua.

Through the work of the many "Y" secretaries in Japan, the program is aiding citizens of that ravaged nation to regain their spiritual perspective, the film demonstrated. Purpose of the program is to imbue a renewed spirit of democracy and reconstruction.

Merlin Donaldson, general secretary of Roseburg and Douglas county YMCA, introduced the film with the statement that about 1,700 persons are served by the Roseburg YMCA each month.

The film showed the activities carried on by a Japanese YMCA secretary in a single day in his efforts to make a contribution to the moral restoration of Japan.

Those without work were taught skills in "Y" classrooms; young men with pessimistic outlooks were sent to the "Y" summer camp—all based upon the principle that youth holds the key to a democratic future for Japan.

Cities in Japan with "Y" organizations—many of which suffered the loss of "Y" buildings through bombing—number 41 with 160 associations.

Other activity saw a three-man helmed delegation from the Roseburg Lions club challenge Rotarians to a preliminary race before Saturday's Applebox derby.

The challenge was accepted and W. L. Torer was appointed to head arrangements for the Rotary entry. Race time will be 9:30 a. m.

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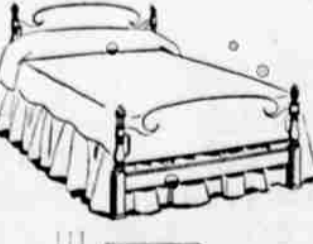
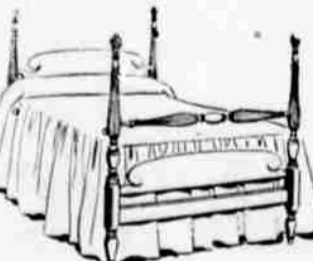
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
