Thailand Thought Next After Korean Cease-Fire

BANGKOK, Thailand — (AP) — Premier Pibulsonggram says a Red Chinese drive to dominate the nations of southeast Asia—including prosperous Thailand—will not be swayed by any cease-fire in Korea.

"The next phase of the Communist program in Asia after any Korean cease-fire will be to invade all countries of southeast Asia," the premier said yesterday in an interview with the Associated Press. "Communist tactics of the world war, infiltration and 'volunteer' invasions will be used against Thailand, Indochina, Burma and then down to Indonesia."

"Scottsboro Boy" Jailed On New Assault Charge

ALBANY, N. Y. — (AP) — A Negro, who identified himself as one of the "Scottsboro boys," is held here on a first-degree rape charge, and Alabama authorities said they would list him as a parole violator.

The man, booked as James Wright, 39, was accused of raping a 13-year-old Negro girl in her home here. He pleaded innocent in police court and was jailed pending an examination July 19.

Wright told police he was one of the nine negroes involved in the notorious rape cases involving two white girls in Alabama two decades ago. He was paroled June 9, 1950, from a 99-year prison sentence. He was the last of the nine to be freed.

In Montgomery, Ala., Secretary L. B. Stephens of the Alabama parole board said that Wright would be declared a parole violator. He added, however, that Alabama would insist that Wright be tried on the rape charge in New York state.

Wright and eight others were charged with raping the white girls March 25, 1931, in a freight car near Scottsboro, Ala. Their convictions were carried to the U. S. supreme court several times.

Wright was sentenced to death in April, 1931. He won a new trial through the U. S. supreme court in 1937, and later was sentenced to 99 years in prison. He was 37 at the time of his arrest in Alabama.

Plea To Governor Last Chance For Wilson Bros.

OLYMPIA — (AP) — A plea to the governor was the last recourse today for Turman and Utah Wilson, facing hanging for the kidnap-murder of 18-year-old John Dewey of Vancouver.

The state supreme court, in a Friday the 13th ruling, yesterday refused to rehear the appeals of the brothers from their conviction in the March, 1950, slaying. The high court decision will be transmitted to Clark county Superior Judge Eugene G. Cushing, who will set a date for the execution.

N. Atlantic Pact Must Have Priority—Bradley

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Gen. Omar N. Bradley told congress today that the North Atlantic Treaty organization must give first priority to "making the forces we have now really effective and ready for combat."

And this cannot be accomplished quickly enough without a sound military aid program from the United States, the chairman of the joint chiefs of staff said.

He went before the house foreign affairs committee with a prepared statement endorsing the administration's proposed new \$8,500,000 program of military and economic assistance as a military necessity and an important contribution toward this nation's security.

tended the preliminary conference did not have the power to discuss problem. The correspondents' problem was the neutrality of the negotiations is just a tiny matter.

Problem Said Unimportant

"5. So it is not a problem that is crucial enough to cause interruption or rupture of the negotiations. American delegates had taken up this matter at the conference. But the negotiations so far made little headway. Even the schedule has not been worked out. Therefore we consider inappropriate to let foreign correspondents come to Kaesong."

"6. We hold a firm stand that all issues should be based upon discussions. Therefore, your one-sided demand is not justifiable. In order to prevent this tiny problem from causing rupture of the negotiations we agree to your proposal to admit not more than 20 foreign correspondents as members accompanying delegates. We have instructed our delegates to offer all facilities necessary to you."

Mixed Reception Greeted Proposal

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of State Acheson's stand for a Korean armistice on the basis of present battle lines got a mixed reception among lawmakers today. Acheson told a news conference yesterday he feels the truce should be based on the fighting front as it now exists and indicated he did not favor withdrawal to the pre-war dividing line of the 38th parallel.

While senators looked upon this as more advantageous than a cease-fire at the 38th, many of them said they wouldn't be satisfied unless definite strides are taken in any true agreement toward unification of Korea.

Senator Bridges of New Hampshire, top Republican on the senate armed services committee, said the present battle line, which bulges north of the 38th parallel, would be "more desirable" as a dividing line than the pre-war boundary between North and South Korea.

"But that doesn't satisfy our aims at all," he said. "What I am for and what I thought we were fighting for is a completely united Korea."

Woman Beaten, House Levelled

A 41-year-old woman living near Leona was in community hospital Friday with a possible skull fracture received when she was beaten about the head Friday morning in an argument.

The scene of the argument, a house on the Rock Creek road about three miles northwest of Leona, burned to the ground shortly afterward.

Sheriff O. T. Carter said deputies and Drain police arrested Lloyd H. Ward, 35, on a charge of assault and battery.

The woman involved was identified as Thelma L. Stout who suffered facial cuts and bruises in addition to the possible fracture; hospital attendants reported.

Officers said the fire apparently started from an old wood stove in the house. Both were out of the house when it started.

Fire Fighters BBattle Only Major Forest Fire

Fire fighters clamped a tenuous hold today on the Pacific Northwest's unbridled major forest fire—a blaze variously estimated as having charred from 3,600 to 8,000 acres on the western slope of the Cascades near Randle, Wash.

Gray-cloud-covered skies, higher humidities and the good chance of weekend rains brought sharp improvement in the critical forest fire situation.

Suit Against Lumber Company Is Dismissed

A \$100,000 damage suit brought against the Youngs Bay Lumber company was dismissed from circuit court Friday as stipulated by both parties.

The suit had been filed by Elsie Lee, widow of Edward Rupert Lee, who died Jan. 30, 1951, of injuries received four days earlier in an accident at a Youngs Bay mill.

All Community Hospital Officers Are Re-elected

All officers of the Douglas Community hospital were re-elected at a reorganization meeting of the board of directors Thursday night.

The officers are Kenneth Ford, president; Dr. Morris Roach, vice-president; Daniel Dimick, secretary; and Frank Ashley, treasurer. New members on the board are O. J. Feldkamp and O. J. Fett, replacing Dr. Roy E. Hanford and Dick Gilman. Ashley and Dr. Roach are the two remaining members of the original board of directors.

Manager J. W. McAlvin reported that the hospital's laboratory has been approved for the year, passing with a 100 percent record. Ninety percent is required. Harold Shank is the laboratory. The report of approval was received from Dr. William Levin of the state Board of Health.

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Probers Say New Findings In Testimony

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senate internal security investigators said today that five hours of secret testimony by Owen Lattimore gave them "fresh evidence" regarding activities of the Institute of Pacific Relations.

Lattimore, far eastern affairs authority, told reporters that he might be so. But he added the inquiry panel had turned up "absolutely nothing" to cause him any worry.

Lattimore, a professor at Johns Hopkins university in Baltimore, has served occasionally as a consultant to the State department.

He was a key figure in last year's senate investigation on charges by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) that Communists and fellow travelers had infiltrated the department.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of state Acheson said Friday a number of employees have been suspended under the State department's loyalty-security program, but he declined to give the total number or name individuals.

Acheson made this statement at a news conference when questions were put to him about previous officials.

He said the suspensions were the result of the application of a statute which, as he understood, was a month or six weeks old.

Officials of other employees who are required to undergo hearings on loyalty or security charges since the application of the law became effective must be automatically suspended, Acheson said.

Those involved in earlier hearings or procedures, he said, have not had to be suspended.

The department disclosed the suspension of two high ranking diplomats, John P. Davies Jr., and Oliver Edmund Clubb, pending hearings which have been ordered on security charges.

Grady, Harriman Hope For Solution

TEHRAN, Iran — (AP) — American Ambassador Henry F. Grady said today he hopes for a "break" in Iran's oil crisis during conversations between riving U. S. Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and Premier Mohammed Mossadegh.

Harriman is expected here tomorrow morning as President Truman's personal envoy. He plans a last-ditch effort to settle the bitter dispute between Britain and Iran over nationalization of the Anglo-Iranian oil company's properties.

Grady made it plain that both sides would have to give a little to bring about a solution.

PARIS — (AP) — W. Averell Harriman said today "I can't help but feel that a solution can be reached" in the British-Iranian oil dispute.

Harriman, President Truman's foreign policy adviser, stopped here on a flight from Washington to Tehran, his wife met him here.
