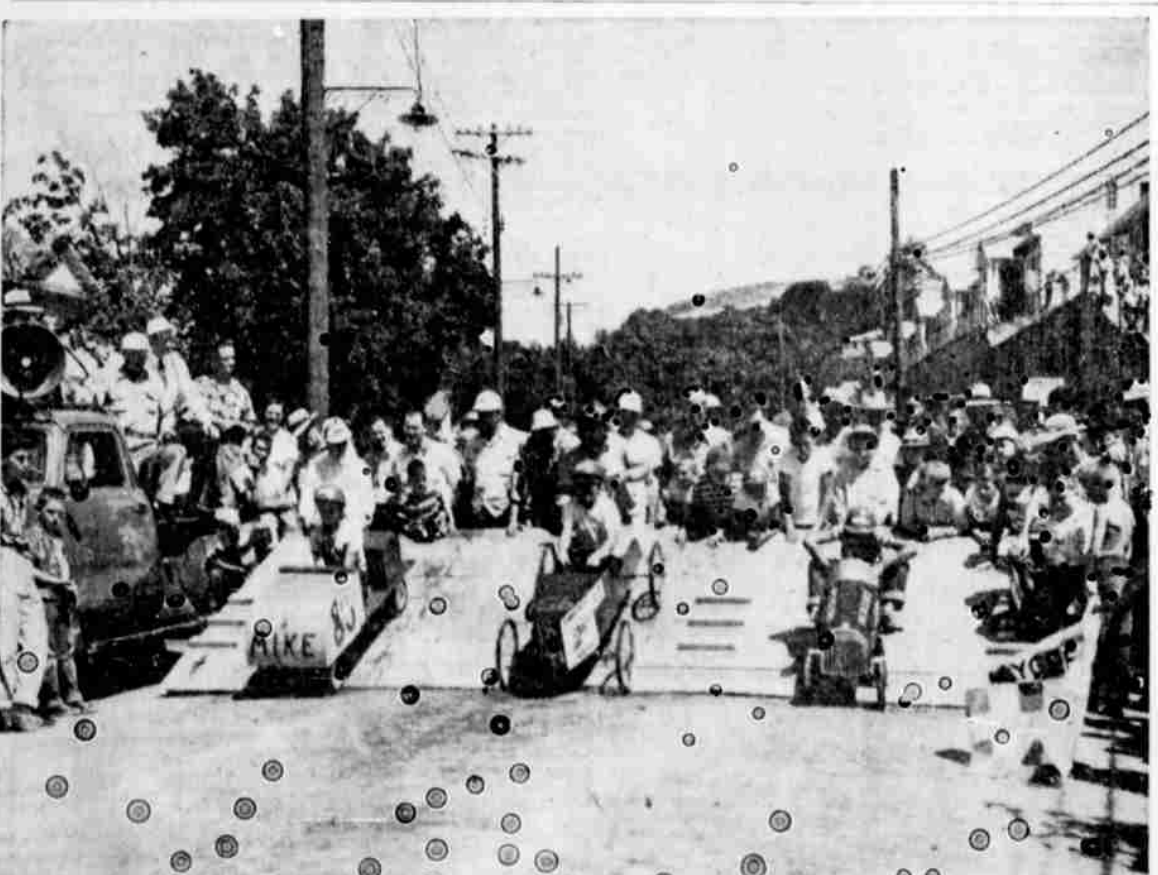

Suicide Attempt Of Actress Fails

NEW YORK—(AP)—Actress Joyce Mathews, former wife of comedian Milton Berle, slashed her wrists Sunday in a suicide attempt while with showman Billy Rose in his plush midtown apartment.

The drama brought Berle to the hospital bedside of Miss Mathews. He summoned his wife, former Olympic swimmer Eleanor Holm, to the apartment located over the Ziegfeld theater.

Saul Richman, Miss Mathews' special manager, said she was called on June 28 to discuss television work and newspaper report linking her name with Rose's.

Miss Mathews' real work would be jeopardized because of the reports and that the custody of her daughter, Vicki, 6, would be taken away from her, Richman said.

In the hospital, where her condition was described as not serious, Miss Mathews was reported in good spirits. Asked by police to give the motive for her act, she replied:

"I just love razor blades."

Police further quoted her as saying that "there is no romantic tieup between me and Billy Rose. I have no romantic interest in him."

Grocery Costs, Prices Scheduled For Survey

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Office of Price Stabilization announced it will conduct a country-wide survey of wholesale and retail grocery costs and prices during the next two months.

The aim, OPS Director DiSalle said in a statement, is "to lay the basis for a program of posted dollar-a-day prices, 'community price' prices in the nation's grocery stores."

DiSalle said his organization wants to learn "whether there is sufficient stability in the prices of a number of standard grocery items to make a 'community pricing' possible."

The survey of wholesalers will begin Monday, July 30; that of retailers, Thursday, Aug. 2.

America Becoming Center For Training Free World

FORT BENNING, Ga.—(AP)—Professional soldiers never have regarded the United States as a military nation. Yet today the American army is one of the great training organizations for the whole world.

You see the uniforms of many nations on the army posts these days.

They represent not only the countries in the North Atlantic Treaty. There are officers from Iran, Israel and Turkey, from the Far East, and many from Latin America. When they go home, the majority become instructors in their own armies.

One former student of Fort Benning—Col. Choy Duk-shin—is now head of the infantry school of South Korea.

Fort Benning, being the infantry center for the American army, usually has several hundred foreign officers on the post at one time.

They spend from one month to eight weeks studying weapons and equipment, training methods, organization, doctrine, and tactics.

Food, A Problem
They are billeted together and they mess together. Each one has a "sponsor"—an American officer who eases him through the unfamiliarities of American life and may even help translate some difficult passage in an army manual.

In some instances, their own governments are not entirely friendly with each other. An Indian officer may be seated across the aisle from a Pakistani.

Arabs and Palestinian Jews, Indonesians and Hollanders are all together. Sometimes they even discuss their political differences.

American food frequently is a problem. Officers from the Orient miss their rice. The Latin Americans need a lot of pepper at first. Dietary laws, based on religion, sometimes create difficulties.

And the Georgia climate, in summer, bothers even the officers from Saudi Arabia.

As a group the foreign officers score with the top American students in the same courses. Recently, a Norwegian major led his whole class up to the final examinations. "We were all pulling for him to take top honors," said Lieut. Col. Stephen J. Meade, who heads the work. "He slipped a little in his finals and finished third."

Learn Through Contact
Meade, a native of Fort Thomas, Ky., has had long foreign service as a military at-

tache in Syria and Lebanon. He feels that one of the great benefits of the program lies in the amount that American army officers learn in trading notes with foreign officers.

The presence of these officers in American training centers does not mean that American weapons and methods are the best in the world.

For example, a Canadian flame-thrower team recently startled our own experts with an exhibition. The Canadian machine more than doubled the extreme range of American flame-throwers and was operated with greater accuracy.

Similarly, many American tankers consider the British Centurion the best medium tank in the world. They are particularly impressed with its 20-pound gun.

The standardization of weapons among so many nations is a long, slow process. Tactics, methods of instruction, and types of organization can be adapted more quickly.

Almost every army has something to contribute.

All these things are going into a central pool today.

The results, in terms of a true United Nations army tomorrow, may be incalculably great.

Knife Blade Taken From Man's Head

NEW YORK—(AP)—A team of four surgeons removed a six-inch knife blade from a man's head in a difficult operation that lasted seven and a half hours Sunday.

The patient, Joseph Alexander, 33, a Negro shipping clerk, was reported holding his own at the Jewish hospital of Brooklyn.

The knife blade had been driven through the Brooklyn man's head behind the eyes in a street stabbing.

A hospital spokesman said the surgeons, headed by Dr. Aaron J. Herman, removed a "good part" of the brain in getting out the knife blade.

The extent of permanent damage caused by removal of the brain tissue could not be determined immediately, the spokesman said.

The blade entered Alexander's head at the right temple. Pierced the skull and almost broke the skin above his left ear. The surgeons used an electric instrument which records brain waves during the operation.

Police said Alexander became involved in a street fight with a man who stabbed him with a hunting knife. A Negro parole violator was sought as the assailant.
