Bulgars Convict Eleven Persons As Tito's Spies

FRANKFURT, Germany — (AP) — The Soviet-licensed news agency ADN reports that 11 "agents, spies and saboteurs" for Yugoslavia were convicted in Bulgaria.

Six of the defendants — all Bulgarians — were accused of crossing into Yugoslavia to receive orders from the Yugoslav secret service, ADN said. Two of these received 12-year jail terms while four were sentenced to 10 years each.

ADN said Georges Borrissoff, also a Bulgarian, drew a five-year term for service in the "Tito espionage service."

Another defendant identified only as the "Tito agent Yanoff" was sentenced to 12 years. Yanoff was said to have fled to Yugoslavia and then returned to Bulgaria as a spy.

Three Yugoslav citizens were sentenced to 10-year prison terms for espionage activities, the ADN report said.

The announcement from the Soviet-controlled news agency came as unconfirmed rumors circulated in London that new trouble has flared in Bulgaria, Poland and Rumania.

Western diplomats said they have heard that both Romania and Bulgaria are weeding out unreliable elements at Russian insistence.

Actress Divorces Her 'Monastic' Husband

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Actress Dolores Costello, not the monastic type, has divorced her second husband, Dr. John Vruwink.

"I got what I would call the monastic treatment," the former wife of the late John Barrymore testified. "Dr. Vruwink wouldn't

speak for days at a time."

Miss Costello, 44, also said the physician was not overly fond of her children, John Barrymore Jr., now 19, and Dolores Blythe, 20. Dr. Vruwink, 60, did not contest the action. They had been married 12 years.

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Argentina Buys Paper Whose Freedom It Crushed

BUENOS AIRES — (AP) — The Argentine government has "bought" the shuttered independent newspaper La Prensa for 13,854,000 pesos (\$1,366,915 at the free rate) and moved its officials right in.

The purchase price, which newspaper officials said was only a fraction of the true value, was set by a federal court under terms of an April 12 law expropriating the paper. The paper's attorneys plan to contest the constitutionality of the expropriation.

Among assets taken over was a new printing press for which La Prensa paid more than \$1,000,000 only a few months ago.

At the time La Prensa was forced to close Jan. 26 it had a daily circulation of 400,000 and sold over 500,000 copies Sundays.

The paper also owns several large plants and much other real estate. The paper's owners are facing a suit for 32,000,000 pesos (\$2,320,000) for back customs duties claimed on newspaper. They have also been ordered to pay 3,000,000 pesos (\$217,000) for alleged infringement of income taxes.

Argentine President Juan D. Peron said in his May day speech that La Prensa would be handed over to "the workers in the form they indicate" after expropriation is completed.

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
