

Prospect Of Korean Armistice Provokes Mixed Feelings Among Many Americans

WASHINGTON — (AP) — There's mixed feeling in this country about a prospective Korean armistice. People will be glad if the shooting ends, but some are deeply bothered. If an armistice is reached near the 38th parallel, they ask, is that what we spent all the American lives and dollars for—we haven't whipped the Chinese and they still hold all North Korea?

Korea? Or some time again will they try another invasion, south of the 38th, with all this for us to do over again?

The questions are good and real. Because they are, they show that any armistice will be an uneasy one. Some obvious answers to them can be attempted but only time can show whether they're right.

Administration Sees Victory

We didn't go into Korea to take over the whole country, says Secretary of State Acheson, ex-

pressing the views of the Truman administration. We went into Korea, he says, solely to stop the aggression of the Communists who invaded South Korea by crossing the 38th. Now they've been pushed back beyond the 38th. Therefore, armistice at the 38th is victory.

But there appear to be only three answers to what to do in Korea, so which would you choose: 1. Settle for the armistice at the 38th? 2. Continue fighting at the cost of more American lives, perhaps indefinitely if we didn't widen the war against the Chinese? The Truman administration wanted to avoid widening it to try to avert immediate World War III.

3. Or make all-out attack on the Chinese, as MacArthur suggested, even if it meant Russia might come in on their side, risking World War III.

This is the administration's position: The real struggle against Communism is against Russia in Europe; there, we have our most important allies, and they are still not ready for World War. If we got into such a war, starting in Asia, we'd have to split our strength between Asia and Europe. In Europe Russia might be able to overrun our allies. Without them, we'd be practically alone in the world.

The Korean adventure has had some disadvantages for the Russians who didn't have to lose a man in Korea since the North Koreans and Chinese did the fighting. Our stand there undoubtedly upset the Communist timetable of conquest; and the shock of the invasion drove this country and its allies closer together and into rearmament.

'No Simple Answer'
But Russia stands to get some advantages from it and perhaps make up lost ground.

Because we'll be uncertain of Communist intentions in this uneasy armistice, if there is one, we'll have to keep a large part of our armed force in Korea, perhaps for years, with so many of our best troops pinned down in Korea, the Communists may try another move elsewhere. In short, it won't cost them a dime to immobilize our only battle-trained troops.

And in this uneasy period the Russians may hope, and work, for other benefits: A slackening of allied rearmament or maybe a split among the allies.

The only reply to a person looking for some simple, single solution to the Korean mess is this: There is no simple answer.

Johnny Goodman, of Omaha was the last amateur to win the U. S. Open championship. That was back in 1933.

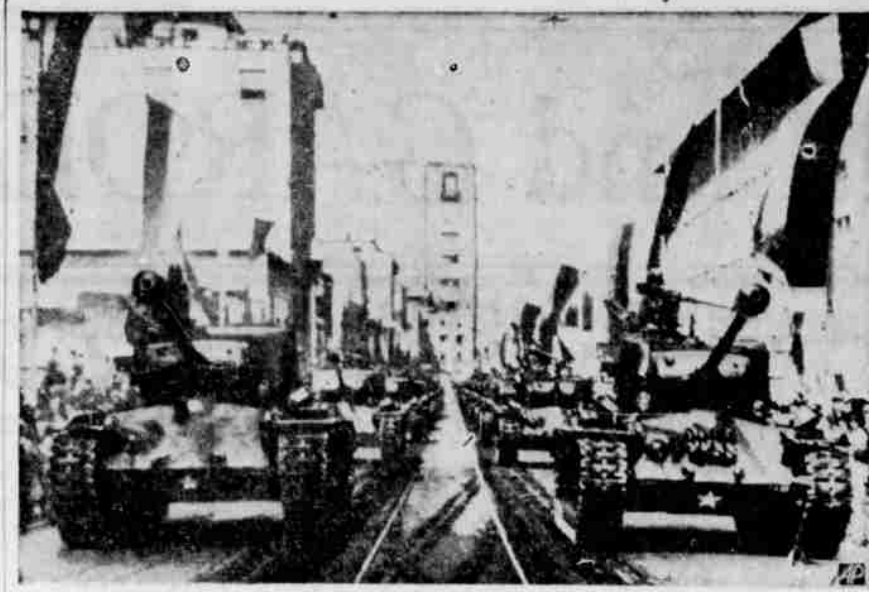

CHICAGO — (AP) — Cincinnati's Tony Trabert, 20-year-old sophomore at the University of Cincinnati, today had come of tennis age with the National Clay Courts title in his keeping.

Trabert, 1951 national intercollegiate champion, yesterday registered a five-set upset of the nation's top-ranked singles star, Art Larsen of San Leandro, Calif., in the clay courts title match. Trabert lost the first two sets, 8-6, 6-2 and trailed 0-3 in the third set before rallying to win 6-4, 6-3, 8-6.

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New Hunting Regulations Announced By Commission

PORTLAND — (AP) — A special four-day season, in which hunters will be allowed to kill deer of either sex in areas bordering highways and farmlands, is permitted under tentative hunting regulations announced by the State Game commission.

Final regulations will be announced in two weeks.

The special season will run from Sept. 15-18. One deer may be killed. Successful hunters will not be permitted to hunt during the regular season Sept. 29-Oct. 21.

Five areas were set aside for the special hunt. Permits are to be issued for each area, perhaps after a drawing. The permit will be free, but a successful hunter will have to buy a deer tag for his kill.

The five areas:
1. Columbia, Washington, Clackamas and Marion counties; 4000 permits.
2. Josephine and Jackson counties (part of Jackson closed); 2000 permits.
3. Curry and southern Coos counties, along the coast highway; 800 permits.
4. Hood river county; 500 permits.
5. Part of eastern Baker county, southeast of Eastern Springs; 400 permits.

The regular deer season will be from Sept. 29 to Oct. 21 in all counties except Sherman.

Special Season Listed

There also will be special seasons for the interstate herd. The first will be Oct. 6-12 in Lake and Klamath counties. Some 3000 permits for antlerless deer will be issued. The next will be in the Silver Lake area of Lake and Klamath counties, 4000 permits for antlerless deer. The last will be in the White River area of Wasco county, 800 permits for antlerless deer.

Elk and antelope seasons will be similar to last year. The western Oregon elk season will be Oct. 27-Nov. 15.

There will be a special elk season in the Tillamook burn Nov. 10-15, with 200 permits being issued.

In response to archers' requests, the commission scheduled an additional archery area for deer. It is in the Clatskanie area of Columbia county, the season to run from Sept. 8 to Sept. 23. Other archery areas: Mt. Emily game refuge, Sept. 8-23; Canyon creek refuge, Sept. 8-23; Tillamook burn, Sept. 15-27; Cow creek game refuge, Sept. 15-27.

The commission also proposed a

special pheasant hunting season for juveniles. It will be on the Willamette. Part of eastern Baker county, Adair. It will be for youths 14 to 17. Benton county, formerly campson game management area in accompanied by adults. They will be allowed two cocks a day. The season will be limited to Oct. 6, 7, 13, 14, Nov. 3, 4, 10, 11, 17, 18, 24, 25, Dec. 1 and 2.

The regular pheasant season will be Oct. 19-Nov. 4 in Columbia, Coos, Clatsop, Yamhill, Polk, Benton, Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, Marion, Linn, Lane, Douglas, Lake Klamath, Josephine, Jackson, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Union, Baker, Wallowa, Grant, Harney and Jefferson counties.

In western Oregon the limit will be two cocks a day, not more than 14 in the season. In eastern Oregon it will be three cocks a day, not more than nine in the season.

Waterfowl regulations will be set later by the federal government.

Spokane Indians Nearing Lead

The Spokane Indians are only a game and a half back of front-running Vancouver in the Western International League pennant chase, thanks to the Sunday ban on baseball in Canadian British Columbia.

Vancouver rested yesterday because of the ban and the Indians, with an assist from the surprising Wenatchee Chiefs, tightened the race by sweeping a doubleheader with Salem 5-4 and 4-3. The game and a half margin between the two clubs was the narrowest since the early days of the 1951 season.

The double defeat dropped Salem to fourth place in league standings, a game behind the Wenatchee Chiefs who improved their own lot Saturday by dumping Vancouver 4-2 and 5-4.

Both games at Spokane were forced into extra innings. The first contest, scheduled for seven innings, was won by Spokane in the last of the ninth. Salem forced the second game to 12 innings before yielding to the Indians.

Tri-City defeated Yakima 5-2 and 3-1 in another Sunday doubleheader. Southpa w Cy Greenlaw held the Bears to six hits in winning the seven inning opener. Augusto Zande gave up seven scattered hits in the regulation nightcap.

Victoria and Tacoma were idle at Victoria. The teams split a doubleheader Saturday. Victoria taking the opener 9-4 and Tacoma the afterpiece 6-1.

Two WFL games are on tap tonight. Tacoma opens at Vancouver and Wenatchee starts a series at Victoria.

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
