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Elliott Reconsiders Resignation Following Stormy Protest Meeting

That "Clarenbach is put in the light of one of the board members and not as an individual." Applause drowned out his last words.

A spectator strenuously opposed Emery's views.

In answering the charge, Clarenbach said that a lot of false rumors had apparently been spread regarding his relationship with the school board and with Elliott.

He said that he had been away from town for the past week and was absent at the time of Elliott's resignation. He urged any doubters as to his position to read the minutes of past board meetings.

He said he had never acted on his own as a board member.

He said he thought Elliott had "done a swell job." In fact, he (Clarenbach) had voted for Elliott's salary increase. Elliott's salary was raised from \$6,000 to \$8,000 in the last budget. But, Clarenbach declared, "I do not like the awarding of illegal contracts." He referred to a \$1,700 cement contract which was later rescinded on grounds that it had not been properly advertised. Harpham later explained that invitations for some bids had not been in enough detail.

Clarenbach said he would never resign as long as he thought he was right. Applause followed his talk also.

Dispute Involves D. R. Smith

Sargent asked if Clarenbach had had any part in Donald R. Smith's resignation. (The resignation of Smith, as superintendent of buildings and properties of the district, was accepted by the board July 9.)

Clarenbach replied that he had never done anything to Elliott. He said he thought Smith had not "prosecuted his job properly" because Smith had been on vacation when the board was receiving calls for bids.

Mr. Smith vigorously defended her husband. She maintained that Mr. Smith had been asked to draw up specifications for bids only a week before his one-week vacation was scheduled. Moreover, he is not an architect, she declared.

She said Clarenbach had asked for Smith's resignation on false grounds of inefficiency. She asserted that bids were very late and should have been called in March or April. Clarenbach's actions have practically stopped maintenance work, she accused.

Clarenbach replied that he had never asked for Smith's resignation.

Expressions of support for Elliott came from many other persons. One said that Elliott's resignation had produced a feeling of insecurity in the school system. He said he supported Emery's remarks in full.

Ricketts said the school system would lose ground by Elliott's resignation. "Let's see if something can't be done to keep him in the system," he insisted. The audience agreed by its applause.

Board Members Reply
Ken Bussey said he saw no need for further discussion but indicated that it was up to the board to prove itself in future relations, or a new board is needed.

School board members N. D. Johnson said he wanted to make it clear that there is "no one member that can sway us. All members vote their own minds," he said.

P. W. Helweg, another board member, said he would like to see Elliott back too, as would the board, but he asked the audience to show how Elliott could be retained.

Chairman Ricketts appointed George West, Arlo Jackson and Mr. Green as a committee representing the assembly to meet in session with Elliott and the school board. The board members and the delegation assured Elliott of the overwhelming support demonstrated for him and urged him to remain in the system. Members of the delegation said, however, they wouldn't ask him to remain in an unhappy situation.

Charge Of Bookmaking Hits S.F. Millionaire
SAN FRANCISCO — (AP)—Archie R. Schaeffer, San Francisco real estate operator and a reputed millionaire, was indicted on bookmaking and conspiracy charges today by the San Francisco grand jury.

Assistant District Attorney Norman Elkington described Schaeffer, who was indicted along with 12 other men, as "San Francisco's bookie king, the real Mr. Big of bookmaking here."

State Of Chamber Listed
The national chamber has taken the following stands on these issues, according to Steiner:

Pay-as-you-go taxes; cut all unnecessary spending; neutralize the national debt; stimulate production; reduce expenditures to the point where they can be afforded; terminate wage-price controls as soon as indirect controls make direct controls unnecessary; and limit credit extensions to financing defense.

Appropriations in Congress are lagging, he said, and this might be detrimental to business interests because of the possibility that they might be restricted at the session's end. Steiner advocated much heavier cuts in appropriations than the two percent hacked by the House.

Cites Examples of Waste
In contrast to President Harry Truman's statement that non-defense spending is being cut to the absolute minimum, Steiner pointed to many evidences of "waste" in domestic spending.

In addition, he noted that "1,000 federal employees being hired each day" are another evidence of waste in domestic spending. Inflation has hit armament, he said, to the point where many tools of war cost four and five times their previous cost. The mounting national debt is a big factor in inflation, he added.

New Flood Blows Holes In Missouri, Oklahoma

also were being moved to higher ground as the water level dropped. Engineers worked feverishly to restore to operation the Turkey creek pumping station, which normally supplies two thirds of Kansas City, Mo., with water. The full task of supplying the city is now being carried by one station.

Water pressure was improving, although there still was a serious shortage in some sections.

North Kansas City, Mo., — a residential and industrial area that has been a ghost town for three days — began returning to normal. Because of flood dangers, the 4,000 residents had been evacuated and business and industry shut down.

The Missouri river, however, failed to breach the dikes and north Kansas City was never flooded.

Topeka Using Bulldozers
Bulldozers were at work in Topeka, the Kansas State capital, scraping six inches to two feet of silt from streets where tide flood waters had receded.

The city's water system still was in trouble. Broken mains caused a vast drain on the supply and flood waters still are around the main plant.

Half of the 20,000 Topekanes forced to leave their homes had returned. Many, however, won't be able to go back for days.

Many hard hit Kansas towns—Manhattan, Junction City, Ottawa, Billen Lawrence, Salina, Great Bend and others — surveyed their damage and turned to rehabilitation work.

Train service showed some improvement. Two of six major railroads operating through Kansas City were able to provide train service out of here Monday night.

As the flood waters rushed eastward across Missouri, army engineers at St. Louis called for more help to sandbag dikes along the Mississippi river. The Missouri empties into the Mississippi north of St. Louis.

The swollen Mississippi has inched its way into the river front industrial area in St. Louis but officials hope a major overflow can be averted.

Surgery Restores Sight For Two Aged Persons
DETROIT — (AP)—"I knew I was going to see," said a greying mother of six after surgeons performed an eye operation to improve the sight that has been failing for 30 years.

She was right. Doctors report that Mrs. Lena Campbell will have good vision from her right eye in two months.

The same is true, they say, of the left eye of William Lowe, 64-year-old resident of White Lake, Mich.

Both will owe this to the corneas from the eyes of Lawrence Shannon, 32, a Detroit office worker who died of a brain tumor.

Collision Of Trains Kills Three, Injures 11

Nickie Plate freight and a Wabash passenger train collided at a cross-over junction Monday night. Three trainmen were killed and 11 persons were hurt.

The trains piled up in a tangled mass near New Haven, seven miles east of Fort Wayne. State police said the freight rammed and side-swiped the passenger train, splintering a day coach.

Killed were three Wabash crew members. They were H. E. (Irene) Waggoner, 69, Danville, Ill., a conductor; William C. Moore, 66, Toledo, Ohio; and James W. Fisher, Peru, Ind.

Insecticide Dousing Kills Worker In Agony
BROWNSVILLE, Tex. — (AP)—A Mexican farm worker bothered by lice doused himself with a powerful insecticide which is supposed to be diluted one part to 300 parts of water.

Filemon Munos, 34, a Mexican citizen, died in agony within a few minutes. Justice of the Peace C. A. Garza, returning a verdict of accidental death, said the substance burns the human skin even when diluted.

Films 'Ex-Huck Finn' Handed Prison Sentence
CHICAGO — (AP)—John E. (Jackie) Moran, 28, the one-time was sentenced to a year and a day in prison Monday for violation of probation.

Federal Judge Michael L. Igoe revoked the two years' probation he had granted the former child star in the "Our Gang" comedies on Jan. 12, 1950. Assistant U. S. District Attorney Robert Downing said Moran cashed three worthless checks for \$180 to buy liquor.

Moran's probation followed his plea of guilty to driving a stolen car from Jacksonville, Fla., to Charleston, S. C.

GIRL DOWNS IN POOL
LEXINGTON, Ore. — (AP)—A 14-year-old girl drowned while swimming in a farm pool two miles northwest of Lexington Monday.

She was Clara Gretta Griffith. She had been living here with an aunt, Mrs. A. M. Edwards.

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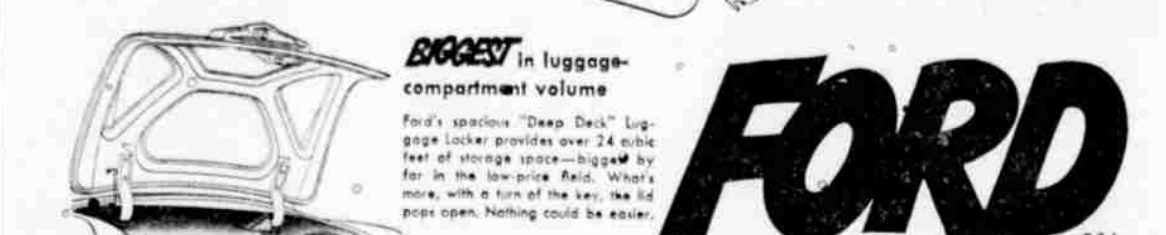
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
