## Angling Good On North Umpqua

Trout angling is good on the North Umpqua river above Steamboat and "flat" in the lower portion, according to the weekly fishing report of the State Game Commission's Roseburg office. Summer steelhead fishing is fair in the Steamboat area and some catches are being made above Rock creek. In the lower Umpqua and central coast regions, trout fishing is fair on coastal lakes and streams. Fishing for warm water fish is fair in most of the lakes. Winchester Bay salmon fishing is good, the report continues. Anglers, however, were warned to use caution in crossing the bar during high tide. In Curry county, trout angling is good on all coastal streams and water is low and clear. Good catches of trout were reported on both the upper Chehalis and Nixia rivers. Salmon catches on the mouth of the Rogue river continue to be good, the report concludes.

It is almost impossible task for private operators. Federal road right-of-way funds have been made available to the state of Oregon, but much of it has been directed elsewhere, he said. Charles Stanton, in his introductory talk, said a chamber of commerce committee has visited large parts of the area in question and wants to invite congressional leaders out to see for themselves. "We believe that our congressmen can be convinced of the need of access road funds if we can just get them on the ground to see it," Stanton said.

## U.S. Gets Spain's Nod To Establish Air, Naval Bases

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States was reported driving ahead today toward American use of Spanish air and naval bases—despite French and British opposition. Authoritative sources said the U. S. and the Franco government had reached a basic agreement to use Iberian bases for western defense. The informants said the agreement, which does not involve an outright Spanish-American alliance, was reached during a conference between Generalissimo Francisco Franco and Admiral Forrest P. Sherman, American chief of naval operations. Britain and France not only oppose the U.S. plan to acquire Spanish bases, but have objected to Spain's association with any member of the Atlantic pact. (Dispatches from London) and Paris said both the French and British felt any association by an Atlantic pact power, with the Franco government would provide Russia with a prime propaganda weapon because millions in Europe view the Franco regime as a Communist Fascist. Military authorities are in general agreement that Spain is of strategic importance to the general defense of Western Europe. It was not definite learned what Franco had said to the U. S. for use of the bases, but it is believed that he gave help in improving Spain's antiquated highways and railroads, industries, air force and army.

## U.S. Again Asks Czechoslovakia To Free Oatis

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Acheson says the United States has started new moves to obtain the release of William Oatis, Associated Press correspondent imprisoned by Communist Czechoslovakia. Acheson told a news conference he expects the Czech government to reply sometime this week. Acheson said that U. S. Ambassador Ellis O. Briggs talked with Czech Foreign Minister Siroky in Prague on Monday, and that Siroky has taken the matter up with the Czech cabinet.

## Civil Service Exam Bars Negroes; Court Gets Case

MOBILE, Ala. (AP)—The Mobile county personnel board believes it has the right to bar Negroes from taking civil service examinations for police jobs. In this belief, the board asked a federal district court to dismiss a suit brought by six Negroes to eradicate racial restrictions in Mobile county's civil service system. The Negroes contend that the personnel board barred them from taking examinations for city patrolmen and firemen.
