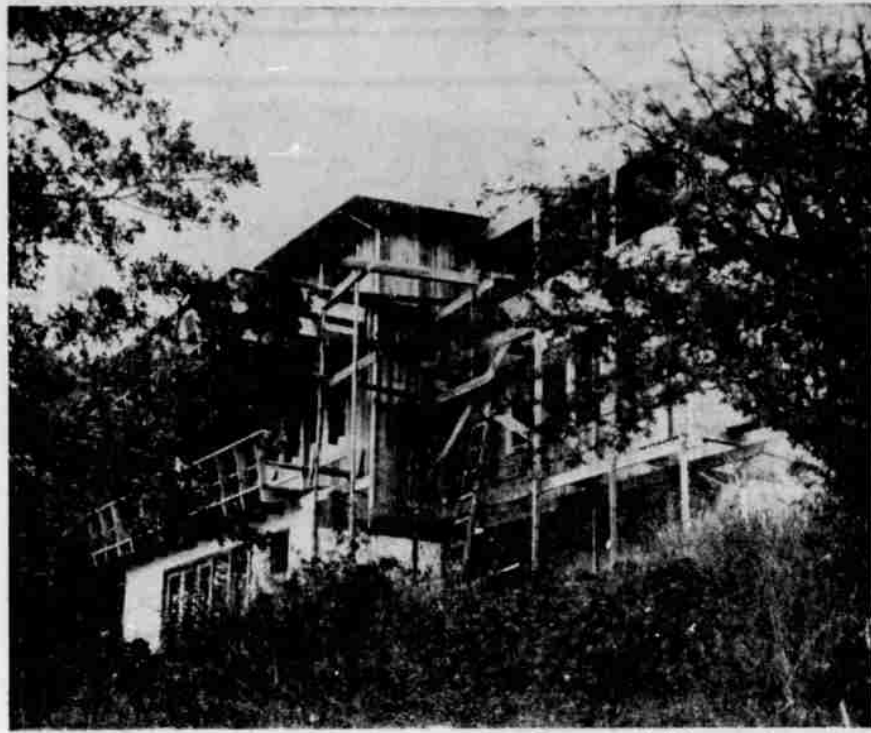

New Hanging Date Set For Wilson Brothers

VANCOUVER, Wash. —(AP)—Superior Judge Eugene Cushing today told Utah and Turman Wilson they are to die on the gallows on Aug. 20.

Stern-faced and brusque, the judge refused to hear a statement from the brothers' attorney or from Turman. The proceeding lasted only about two minutes. The execution date was set as one of the final steps in the penalty assessed against them for the kidnap slaying of Jo Ann Dewey here some 16 months ago.

Goal For Oregon Chest Increased

PORTLAND —(AP)—Oregon residents will be asked to contribute \$195,768 more than last year for the 1951 community chest drive. Chairman Charles A. Sprague said that stepped-up military mobilization would account for most of the increase. Last year the chest budgeted only \$40,134 for the United Defense fund, which finances the USO. This year \$153,560 was budgeted. Portland and Multnomah county will be asked for about 60 percent of the chest budget. The other 40 percent will come from the rest of the state. Of the 14 chest-supported agencies, only three are to receive less money than last year. They are the Children's Farm home, the

Christie home and Our Lady of Providence.
