

Church Of God To Change Site

The First Church of God at Garden Valley road and Walnut street will be moved about Aug 1 to a new location on Chestnut street. Excavation for the basement has already been completed and the drainage pipe is now being laid.

The Rev. H. A. Schlatter, pastor of the church, reports that plans are in progress for a new and larger tabernacle with additional Sunday school rooms, which will be adjacent to the present building.

The new structure will be started in the spring of next year or sooner. It will have a capacity of 200 to 300 persons. A large parking area is also planned.

Walter S. Hunt Estate Appraisal Is Filed

The estate of Walter S. Hunt, Oakland farmer, who died April 19, 1951, was appraised at \$82,794.80, according to an inventory filed Thursday.

Hunt died at Community hospital in Roseburg at the age of 73. His heirs are Chauncey G. Hunt, a brother, of Sutherlin, and Laura E. Hunt, a sister, of Oakland.

Among his assets were \$9,025 in United States Savings bonds, a half interest in Hunt brothers, a farm and livestock concern, amounting to some \$39,000, and a half interest in some 2,800 acres of real property amounting to \$21,000.

The estate was appraised by E. G. Young, Roseburg, and H. W. Norton and Sherman Smith, both of Sutherlin. Chauncey G. Hunt is administrator.

Damage Action Against Logging Firms Settled

A circuit court suit against two Camas Valley logging concerns by Wesley Durland was dismissed from court Thursday after the parties had stipulated the case had been settled out of court.

A. J. and A. H. Bartley, doing business as Bartley brothers, a trucking company of Camas Valley, and Phillip E. and Julia Johnson doing business as a Camas Valley logging operation, had been named defendants.

The suit, filed Feb. 13, 1951, asked for \$75,000 general and \$4,788.20 special damages resulting from an alleged logging truck accident July 11, 1950, while Durland was working for the Johnsons. At the time of the accident he had been assisting the Bartley brothers in a log removal operation, the complaint stated.

city's two pumping plants — one on the Missouri and the other on the Mississippi — with coal and chemicals.

A small levee collapsed on the Missouri and water poured over the top of another, spilling over the Creve Coeur area northwest of St. Louis where about 300 persons live. Some residents already had been evacuated and others were being moved out.

Two more levees near the junction of the two rivers gave way, increasing the threat to the village of West Alton, Mo., population 300. One bridge remains.

Only one Missouri river bridge remains in use between Kansas City and St. Charles near the mouth of the stream, across the state. That is the Daniel Boone bridge upstream from St. Charles. Highway department officials were not sure how long it would remain open.

The flood waters were ebbing at Jefferson City, the state capital in central Missouri. There the Missouri had flooded parts of some 50 blocks and about 350 persons had to be moved out.

Missouri's highways were closed at 62 points by high water.

Rail yards at the river level in North St. Louis are paralyzed. A number of waterfront plants have been shut down.

lands for \$995,000 to build forest access roads in Oregon.

Bayly described the bill as a "serious mistake." He met with representatives of Oregon's 18 O&C counties, which has passed the Senate and is now before the House.

He charged the counties involved stand to lose \$2,000,000 a year under the proposal.

The Oregon and California land grant act, passed in 1937, provided that Oregon counties in which O & C land is located receive 50 percent of receipts from sale of timber in lieu of taxes.

It also provided for payment of an \$8,000,000 federal debt incurred when the lands were revested from the O & C railroad. When the debt was paid (payment was completed this year), the counties were to receive an additional 25 percent of sales in lieu of taxes.

But Cordun said Wednesday he doesn't think the House will appropriate the additional funds. He said Congress has been reluctant to pay even 50 percent. That's why he's seeking the access roads appropriation instead of the additional receipts, he declared.

Armistice Talks Halted In Korea By Flash Flood

tion, except that the troops were prisoners of war in barbed wire enclosures.

The fate of almost all the Gloucestershire men has been a mystery. They were trapped, surrounded and overrun by overwhelming numbers of Chinese Reds in the battle of the Imjin river in western Korea April 23-25.

Only 44 of more than 600 men of the regiment's first battalion were able to fight their way back to Allied lines. Thirty-three days later Greek troops recaptured the area and discovered one badly wounded survivor, Pvt. Lionel Essex, concealed in a hut.

The rest of the men in the battalion have been listed as dead, wounded or missing.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The army estimated enemy casualties in Korea through July 13 at 1,213,544.

This is an increase of 10,616 over the previous week. But the only sure figure in the calculations is the number of counted prisoners of war.

Chinese casualties were estimated at 502,453, including 506,000 battle losses, 79,000 non-battle casualties and 17,453 counted prisoners.

North Korean losses were placed at 611,091. This included 374,000 battle casualties, 91,000 non-battle losses and 146,091 counted prisoners of war.

New High School Building Planned By Glide District

Sealed bids will be received up to 8 p.m. Aug. 14 by Glide School district No. 12 for construction of a new high school building. The bids will be opened on that date, according to a published notice appearing elsewhere in the News-Review.

The school, designed by Freeman, Hayslip and Tuft, Portland architects, will consist of four general classrooms, two laboratories, a library, administration offices, general office, teachers' office and health room and a home making department.

In addition there will be a 79 by 97-foot physical education room, which will be used as an assembly, a gymnasium and physical education classes. There will be a 30 by 97-foot basketball court, a stage, dressing room and showers. Equipped with a balcony, the building will accommodate 1500 persons.

There will also be a separate wood-working and arts building 40 by 62 feet.

Of frame construction and brick veneer facing, the building will be one of the most modern in this locality, according to A. N. Freeman of the architect firm. It will have 10 teacher stations and be large enough to handle 250 students. Provision is made for enlargement of the building by adding extensions if the need arises.

The enrollment for the consolidated Glide and Deer Creek districts will be about 135 next year.

The present school building, used now for grade and high school purposes, will be converted to grade school use only.

The site, to the north alongside the new North Umpqua highway through Glide, has been graded and laid out. Parking will be available for 250 cars.

Crane Operator Killed By Live Wire Touch

ALBANY, Ore. — (AP) — A crane touched a 12,000-volt power wire in east Albany Thursday, killing Elmer Jerde, 45, the operator.

Ervin Anderson, his brother-in-law and assistant, tried to pull Jerde free from the crane and suffered hand burns.

The accident occurred on the Edward Construction company property.

The widow and seven children survive Jerde.

Two Oregon Forest Fires Being Trailed

Fire in the Fremont national forest northwest of Lakeview roared through Ponderosa pine at a 200-acre-an-hour rate Thursday night as gusty winds swept the long-dry forests.

But today the wind slackened and forest service officials poured between 400 and 500 men into the fight. Eleven bulldozers started at dawn building trail around the 3,000-acre blaze.

Another fast-moving fire of Thursday, the Kennedy gulch blaze in northern Josephine county, was relatively quiet today and more than 100 men were working on trails which at dawn were nearly two-thirds round the burned 500 to 700 acres.

Solon Sticks To Charge Against Secy. Marshall

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator McCarthy (R-Wisc) has challenged "anyone" to find one false line in a recent speech in which he accused Secretary of Defense Marshall of a tie-up with a Communist conspiracy against the United States.

This was McCarthy's response to a remark by President Truman that the charge against Marshall was one of the silliest things he ever heard of.

McCarthy told newsmen later that he made the 70,000-word senate speech about the Defense secretary because "I felt that if the politicians were going to ask us to follow Marshall's global strategy, we should have a history on him."

Alleged Confidence Man Confesses Tax Dodging

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A Mason, described by senators as a professional confidence man who fleeced victims of thousands of dollars, testified today he has filed no income tax returns since about 1929.

Mason, peg-legged man, was questioned about his income tax by a special senate investigations subcommittee.

He took the witness chair after Senator Hoey (D-Ne), the committee chairman put in the record what he termed Mason's criminal record. Hoey previously had said the record is a long one.

Five witnesses testified yesterday that Mason fleeced them of more than \$200,000 by promising to obtain bargain leases on "surplus" government buildings and to arrange for business contracts.

For President: Hoover, That Is J. Edgar Of FBI

WASHINGTON — (AP) — J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the FBI, has been suggested as a popular candidate for the Republican presidential nomination in 1952.

Rep. Shafer (R-Mich) said in a statement yesterday in the congressional record that the "Hoover-for-president" idea came from one of his constituents after "grass roots" consultation with others.

Declaring that he was "glad to endorse" the proposal, the Michigan lawmaker added:

"Let there be a prompt response by way of organization meetings and activities of like-minded Americans across the land. They have a candidate who would be a favorite son of every state."

Double Tragedy Follows One Month Of Marriage

OKMULGEE, Okla. — (AP) — A man gunning for his estranged wife after a month of marriage killed his stepdaughter instead and then fatally wounded himself.

Dead were Myrna Ruth Johnson, 16, and Robert Lee Massengale, about 60.

County attorney Wesley Combs said the girl was hit three times as she lay on a pallet in the living room with her mother and cousin. He said witnesses told him they believed Massengale was trying to hit his wife.

SPREE DRAWS \$50 FINE

Ollis Martin Coffman, 37, Veterans hospital, was fined \$50 on a drunkenness charge in district court Thursday, according to Judge A. J. Geddes. Coffman was arrested by state police.

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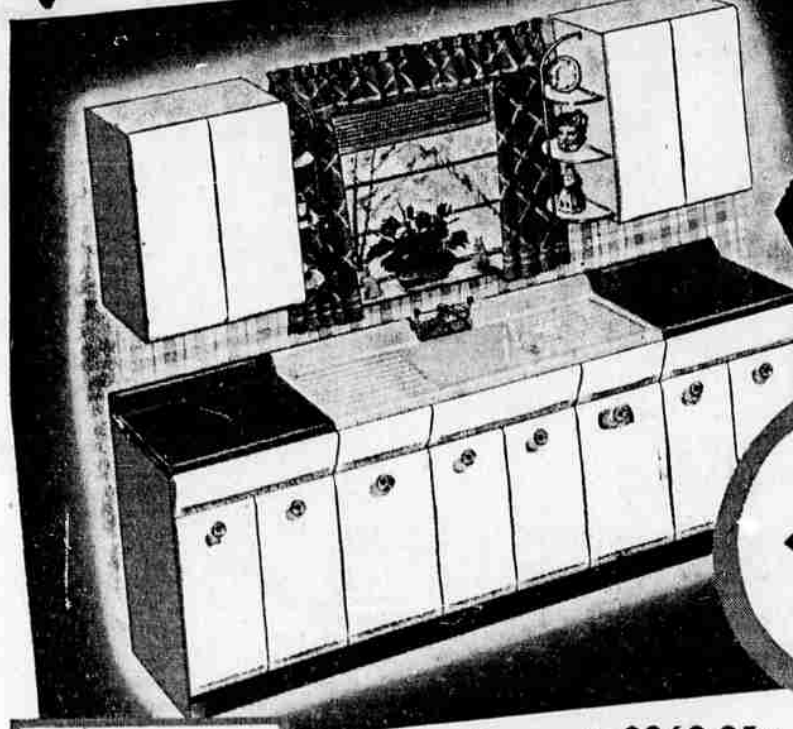
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
