

Citation Retired After Reaching Goal

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — (AP) — "The big horse is through!" With those five words, finish was written to the racing career of Citation, the first million dollar winner in turf history and a thoroughbred many call the greatest of all time.

Jimmy Jones, the Calumet's trainer, who has guided Citation since first he groped as a shakylegged yearling in his native Kentucky, said the words. He said them with tears in his eyes, sadness in his voice.

Retirement of Citation at the nice old age of six was the wish of Mrs. Warren Wright. She is the widow of the master of the Calumet farm in the bluegrass country, and it was her husband who

set the final goal for Citation. The goal was \$1,000,000. Citation hit and passed the mark last Saturday when he won the \$100,000 Hollywood Gold Cup handicap. The \$100,000 sent his all-time earnings up to \$1,085,760.

The mark will stand for a long time. There is no one on the scene now, from all appearances, able to threaten it.

Raced 45 Times
The cold record shows that Citation raced 45 times. Of those starts, he captured 32 wins. He ran second 10 times — seven during a troublesome year of 1950. He raced third twice, when he was just getting going again early this spring. He ran out of the money but once — last May.

The cold record could never tell the Citation story.

Youthful Jimmy commented: "Greatest horse I ever saw. I had a lot of fun with him, even if I did get bricks in my belly every time he ran."

"Citation is sound now. Best shape he's been in in a long time. He's bowing out at a great time. And if we raced him some more — well, any horse can get broken up in a race. Might never happen, but again, it might."

Citation was the scourge of the three-year-old division in 1948. He won the triple crown — Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont — in scorching fashion.

He won 19 of 20 races that year and amassed the unprecedented sum for a three-year-old of \$709,470.

Penn Will Abide By NCAA Ruling

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — University of Pennsylvania, the NCAA's prodigal son, was back home today amid handshakes all round, and television, college football's fattest calf, will be killed off as scheduled.

That was the announcement yesterday from Professor Hugh C. Willett, president of the NCAA. He said Penn has finally agreed to the NCAA's plan for an experimental moratorium on football telecasts this autumn.

Thus ended a two months controversy which began when Penn balked at the video curtailment and announced its intention to televise all its home games.

The NCAA retaliated by declaring Penn a member "not in good standing" and subject to removal by vote of the membership. All major universities and colleges belong to the association.

Will Comply With Plan
Willett said a statement from Francis Murray, the Penn athletic director, informed him of Penn's decision to string along with the NCAA. The university agreed to televise its games in compliance with the controlled plan of the entire membership.

This plan, adopted last January, calls for varying limitations on football telecasts with a view toward determining the effect of video on attendance and gate receipts.

Pennsylvania challenged the constitutionality of the setup and broached the possibility that it might be in violation of federal anti-trust laws. The dispute led to unpleasantness between Murray and Adm. Tom Hamilton, chairman of the NCAA television committee.

As it developed, the pressure was clearly on Penn. Several schools served notice that they would break off athletic relations if Penn persisted in defying the NCAA.

Willett reiterated his assurance that despite the curtailment, there will be "plenty of games televised this fall."

Roy, Haddock Will Wrestle Saturday Night

Gentleman Dale Haddock, the Wayne, Mich., matmaster, looked extremely impressive in defeating Cowboy Carlson in two out of three falls with a arm-stomper here last week. But the local grappling railbirds believe that Frenchie Roy has a good chance to upset the Pacific Coast lightweight titleholder.

The Haddock-Roy match will be the semi-final attraction on the weekly wrestling show at the Roseburg armory arena Saturday, featured by a "semi-final" coast junior heavyweight title tilt between Con Bruno and Ace Abbott.

Roy, the French-Canadian from Quebec, made a big hit in his last two appearances, and has the ammunition to score an upset over the midwesterner who won the coast crown from Eddie Williams.

Major interest is certain to be centered around the one-hour main event, with Abbott, who beat Rufus Jones here last week, specializing in a "trigger" hold as against Bruno's crotch-and-pin hold. Although held to a draw by Cowboy Carlson here several weeks ago, the chunky 195-pounder is favored over the tough Texan and win the right to a coast junior heavyweight title match against Frankie Stojack here in the near future.

With the match holding such extreme importance, the skirmish may develop into one of the most torrid tilts of the season.

A special one - fall, 20-minute match will open the program at 8:45 p.m. with Tex Hager meeting Mike Nazarran. The wild little Armenian will be meeting an old local favorite in Hager, who is a former coast titleholder and was once a world's title contender. Hager, former Creswell, Ore., resident, made his home here briefly several years ago.

Elton Owen will return to action as referee for all three bouts.
