Negro Scientist, Barred From Club Feast, Hits Back

CHICAGO — (AP) — Chicago's exclusive Union League club was charged by Dr. Percy L. Julian, noted Negro chemist, with discrimination and un-American conduct in refusing to seat him at a private luncheon at the club.

Dr. Julian said he was one of a group of scientists and industrialists invited to the luncheon by Dr. Joseph W. Barker, president of the Research corporation of New York City. The speaker was Dr. Robert R. Williams of New York, a

pioneer in vitamin research, who had just returned from a tour of Far Eastern countries.

Dr. Julian said Barker telephoned him Wednesday morning and said that Taylor Hay, manager of the Union League club, had told him Julian would not be permitted to attend the luncheon. Hay said he was "acting on explicit orders from the club's directors, who have issued a ruling barring Negroes."

"It appears to me," Julian said, "that organizations like the Union League club are as directly responsible as any other agency for the bombing of my home and the Cicero riot."

Julian's home is in suburban Oak Park and last Nov. 22 the interior was splashed with gasoline and an attempt was made to set it afire. On June 12 a bomb

exploded in the yard but caused no damage. Rioting broke out in Cicero last week after a Negro family attempted to move into an apartment in the all-white suburban community.

"When individuals in high places behave as the Union League club behaves, ordinary citizens follow suit," Julian said.

Julian, who is director of research in Chicago for the Gildred Co., was named "Chicagoan of the year" in 1950 in a poll conducted by the Chicago Sun-Times. He was honored for his work in developing synthetic drugs for treatment of arthritis and rheumatic heart disease.

The Elgarose 4-H Twisters, 4-H meeting, which will be held on Thursday evening July 19.

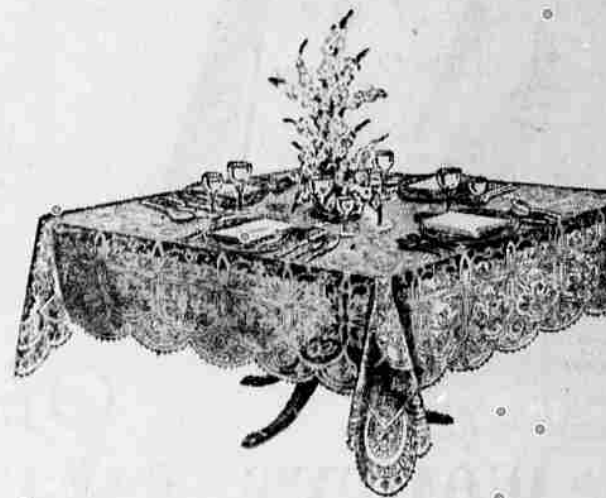
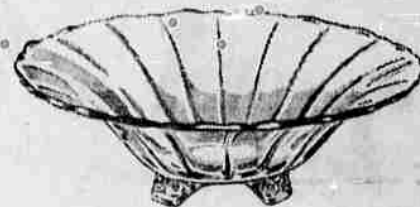
