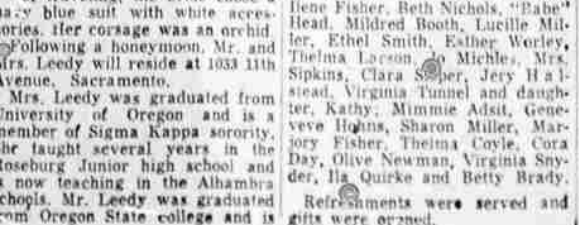
Donna Jean Ellison, also a pupil of Miss Strong and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Ellison, was an able accompanist for Galen.
