GLIDE

CHOW-CHOW RELISH

1 gallon chopped cabbage
12 onions
12 green peppers
12 red peppers
2 quart chopped green tomatoes
5 cups sugar
4 tablespoons mustard
1 tablespoon ginger
4 tablespoons mustard seed
3 tablespoons celery seed
2 tablespoons mixed whole spices
2 1/2 quarts vinegar

Chop onions and peppers. Mix all vegetables with 1/2 cup salt. Let stand overnight. Drain. Add sugar and spices to vinegar. Simmer 10 minutes. Then add vegetables and simmer until hot and well-seasoned. Pack hot chow-chow into hot jars; seal at once.

CHERRY JAM

(Yield: about 1 six-ounce glasses)
4 cups prepared fruit
1 cup sugar
1 bottle liquid fruit pectin

To prepare the fruit. Stem and pit about 2 1/2 pounds fully ripe sour cherries. Chop fine and measure 4 cups into very large saucpan. To make the jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucpan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in bottle fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. (Note: For stronger cherry flavor, add 1/4 teaspoon almond extract before ladling jam.)

Sweet Cherry Jam. Substitute sweet cherries for sour cherries in the above recipe. Use only 3/4 cups prepared fruit and add 1/4 cup lemon juice.

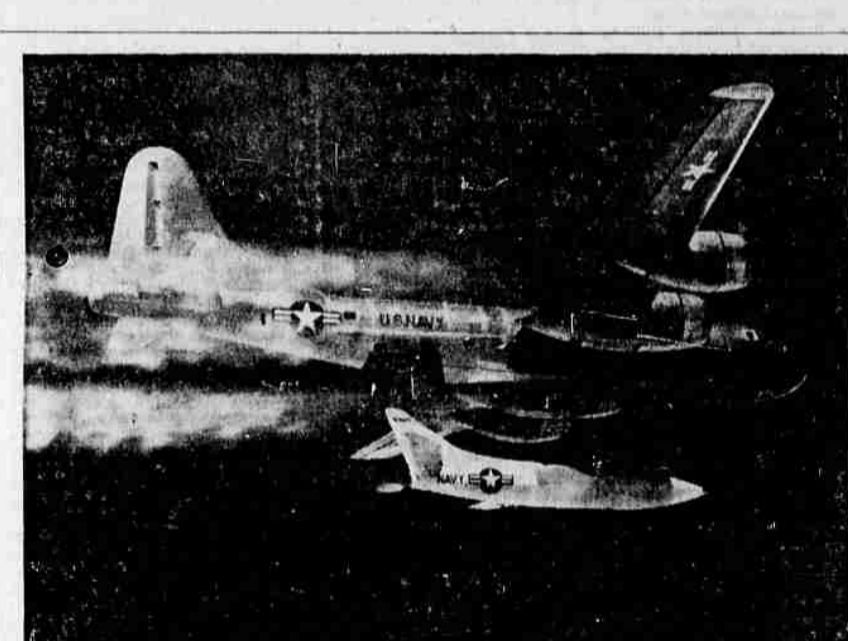
