Economist Hits Defense Idea in Price Program

WASHINGTON — (AP) — An economics professor urged Congress to kill a bill to set up "good faith" as a defense against price discrimination charges.

Dr. Vernon A. Mund, Seattle, University of Washington professor, testified at a senate small business committee hearing that the effects of a seller's behavior is the only way to determine price discrimination.

"His 'intent' or 'motive' is profit — and this motive is neither one of 'good faith' or 'bad faith' — it is a commercial fact," he said.

The bill would establish "good faith" as a defense for a seller in meeting a low price of a competitor. The bill provides that the seller would not be deemed to have acted in good faith "if he knew or should have known that the lower price" was unlawful.

Tuna Valuable Proteins' Source

Don't let the scarcity of high price of meat get you down. There are lots of other foods, more plentiful and less expensive, that can give your family the protein and sense of satisfaction they need to be strong and happy.

Canned tuna is as good a source of "complete" protein as meat and there is an abundant supply of it in our markets. In this unusually delicious recipe, tuna is combined with the new instant chicken cubes, milk, eggs and flour to produce a dish manfully supplied with top quality protein.

Tuna Tetrazzini (6 servings)

One-half pound thin spaghetti, ¼ cup butter or margarine, ¼ cup flour, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon paprika, 5 instant chicken bouillon cubes, 1 cup water, 1 tall can evaporated milk, 1 7-ounce can tuna, flaked; 4 hard-cooked eggs, coarsely chopped; ¼ cup minced green pepper; ¼ cup grated Parmesan cheese (optional).

Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water until tender; drain. Melt butter or margarine in top of double boiler; blend in flour, pepper and paprika. Add instant chicken bouillon cubes; crush and blend in. Add water and evaporated milk; stir over low heat until smooth

and thickened. Cover; cook over hot water 10 minutes. Divide sauce in half; to ½ add spaghetti; blend well. Add tuna, eggs and green pepper to remaining sauce. Arrange spaghetti in serving dish; top with tuna mixture; sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese. For a summer luncheon, deep sea chowder offers a protein rich treat.

Deep Sea Chowder (6 servings)

One-eighth pound fat salt pork, diced; 1 medium onion, chopped; 2 instant chicken bouillon cubes, 2 cups hot water, 3 medium potatoes diced; 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 7-ounce can tuna, flaked; 2 cups milk, minced parsley.

Fry salt pork in saucapan until crisp and golden brown; drain on absorbent paper. Cook onion in salt pork drippings until soft but not brown. Dissolve instant chick-
